DIVINE MERCY SUNDAY



God commands us to be merciful to others through our prayer life, actions, words, and alms giving. If we are lacking in these areas, we are ignoring God's call. His message is clear and constant. Today is a significant celebration of Christ's mercy.

More than 2,000 years ago at the Last Supper Jesus commanded his apostles to be merciful servants to all people. Mercy is mentioned more than 260 times in the bible.

Less than 100 years ago, He gave St. Faustina, a Polish nun, 14 revelations of love and mercy to share, which she did in her diary - *Divine Mercy in My Soul - The Diary of St. Maria Faustina* (published in 1981) - considered by the church as one of the greatest books of faith.

It was during Christ's first revelation to St. Faustina, when He asked for a feast to celebrate His mercy and this be held the first Sunday after Easter. It was Pope St. John Paul II at the canonization of St. Faustina on April 30th, 2000, that the feast – Divine Mercy Sunday – was declared.

According to her diary entry (699), Jesus told St. Faustina, "My daughter, tell the whole world about My inconceivable mercy. I desire that the Feast of Mercy be a refuge and a shelter for all souls, and especially for poor sinners. On that day the very depths of My tender mercy are open. I pour out a whole ocean of graces upon those souls who approach the fount of My mercy. The soul that will go to Confession and receive Holy Communion shall obtain complete forgiveness of sins and punishment. On that day are opened all the divine floodgates through which graces flow. Let no soul fear to draw near to Me, even though its sins be as scarlet. My mercy is so great that no mind, be it of man or of angel, will

be able to fathom it throughout all eternity. Everything that exists has come from the very depths of My most tender mercy. Every soul in its relation to Me will contemplate My love and mercy throughout eternity. The Feast of Mercy emerged from My very depths of tenderness. It is My desire that it be solemnly celebrated on the first Sunday after Easter. Mankind will not have peace until it turns to the Fount of My mercy."

During another vision, Jesus directed her to share Christ's message of mercy in an image to be painted for the world to see that includes the words, "Jesus, I trust in You." With the help of her spiritual director Fr. Michael Sopocko, St. Faustina found Eugene Kazimierowski to create the original image of the Divine Mercy painting.

Jesus told her that many graces would pour out on anyone who prayed before the image: "I promise that the soul that will venerate this image will not perish. I also promise victory over [its] enemies already here on earth, especially at the hour of death. I Myself will defend it as My own glory" (*Diary*, 47, 48).

To help us act on Christ's command to be merciful the Catechism of the Catholic Church gives us the Spiritual Works of Mercy and the Corporal Works of Mercy: "The works of mercy are charitable actions by which we come to the aid of our neighbor in his spiritual and bodily necessities. Instructing, advising, and comforting are Spiritual Works of mercy, as are forgiving and bearing wrongs patiently. The Corporal Works of mercy consists especially in feeding the hungry, sheltering the homeless, clothing the naked, visiting the sick and imprisoned, and burying the dead. Among all these, giving alms to the poor is one of the chief witnesses to fraternal charity: it is also a work of justice pleasing to God:

"He who has two coats, let him share with him who has none and he who has food must do likewise. But give for alms those things which are within; and behold, everything is clean for you. If a brother or sister is ill-clad and in lack of daily food, and one of you says to them, "Go in peace, be warmed and filled," without giving them the things needed for the body, what does it profit?" (CCC 2447).

Just as Jesus told St. Faustina, "I am giving you three ways of exercising mercy toward your neighbor: the first — by deed, the second — by word, the third — by prayer. In these three degrees is contained the fullness of mercy, and it is an unquestionable proof of love for Me." (*Diary*, 742).

Petter Eager to Help Others on Faith Journey



Jessica Petter hopes to spark the fire within the souls of the faithful across the state of West Virginia as the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston's new assistant director of evangelization and catechesis.

Petter is from Arkansas, where she was the youth ministry director for St. Stephen Catholic Church in Bentonville, and before that at St.

Vincent de Paul Parish in Rogers, Arkansas. She earned her degree in theology from Franciscan University of Steubenville. She grew up in a Eureka Springs, Arkansas, a resort town in the Ozark Mountain region. She was raised Catholic, but admits there was a time in her life, when her faith was more of a stale obligation than a joyful part of how she identified herself.

"I understand how we can get stuck and not grow in faith," she said. "It took me years to realize that God loves me for

Two things that helped reignite her faith. The first was attending a Steubenville Youth Conference as a young adult and the second was meeting Betsy McNeil. The Steubenville Youth Conferences are held across North America through Franciscan University of Steubenville to energize young adults and adults about God and the Church. She said McNeil continues to be a great spiritual guide and keeps her accountable.

"She wants the best for me and reminds me that Jesus loves us in our brokenness no matter how great or trivial that is," Petter said.


For the Church, that we may be a compassionate and forgiving people as we preach repentance for the forgiveness of sins to all the nations, let us pray to the Lord. . .
