"All things bright and beautiful, all creatures great and small, all things wise and wonderful the Lord God made them all."

This sweet poem found in many children's books and artwork was originally a hymn first published in 1848 in *Hymns for Little Children* by Cecil Frances "Fanny" Alexander. The song was written by the Irish Christian poet and song writer based on the opening statement of Apostles Creed, "I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth." The Apostles creed is used as a testimony of faith not only by

the Roman Catholic Church, but also the Anglican, and some Protestant churches.

The hymn has evolved and changed through the years to emphasize the amazing world God created for us. Oregon Catholic Press (OCP) shares the Laura Wasson's version of the song, which changes the meter and harmony for children's choirs. You can listen to it [HERE](#).

Versions of the song and poem often go on to include this last stanza, which inspires and reminds us to take action in honor of our Lord, "God gave us eyes to see them, and lips that we might tell. How great is God Almighty, who has made all things well!"

The Church teaches us to care for God's creation. So, make **Earth Day** special.

Pope Francis' encyclical *Laudato Si'*, "Care for Our Common Home," he emphasizes caring for our environment through faith, hope, and love as a fundamental tenet of our Catholic identity.

Catholic Social Teaching also outlines it is our duty to care for God's creation and called to protect people and the planet. Showing respect for the earth and creation shows love of God, Creator of heaven and earth - "the land, the rivers, the sea and the animals that inhabit them - but also and especially God's human creation: men, women and children and how our actions and inactions affect their wellbeing," Bishop Mark Brennan said this past fall in a teleconference with Catholics on ecology, economy, environment and human dignity.

In *Laudato Si'*, Pope Francis warns us, "(Mother Earth) cries out to us because of the harm we have inflicted on her by our irresponsible use and abuse of the goods with which God has endowed her."

This week let our actions be louder than our words. Be mindful on how you respect God's creation in all forms.



VENERABLE MATTEO FARINA ~ PRAY FOR US

"We must live every day as if it were the last, but not in the sadness of death, but rather in the joy of being ready to meet the Lord!"

These are the words of Venerable Matteo Farina. Last spring, Pope Francis advanced the cause of sainthood for Farina, a popular Italian teenager who died in 2009 from a brain tumor.

Farina was born in 1990 and grew up in a strong Catholic family in Brindisi, in southern Italy. At a very young age he was captivated by his faith and the lives of St. Francis of Assisi and St. Padre Pio, who were Capuchin friars just like the pastors of his church.

At the age of nine, he had a vivid dream and said St. Padre Pio told him "who is without sin is happy," and he must get others to understand this truth, "so that we can all go together, happy, to the kingdom of heaven."

After sharing the dream with his family and friends he began to keep a journal and write poetry and meditations. He wanted to evangelize, his peers he knew and those he did not.

In 2003 after his confirmation and just before his 13th birthday, Farina began to have severe headaches doctors later



connected to a brain tumor. For the next six years he underwent several brain surgeries and chemotherapy. His positive attitude and goal to get people to fall in love with Christ did not falter. His love for Mary strengthened. He said the rosary every day, and when he was not receiving medical treatments, he was in school and hung out with his friends who like him loved music and sports.

In one of his last journal entries Farina wrote about how important it is to hold onto Jesus:

"My God, I have two hands, let one of them be always clasped to you in order to hold you closer in every trial. And let the other hand fall throughout the world if this is your will... as I know you by others, so let others know you through me. I want to be a mirror, the clearest possible, and if this is your will, I want to reflect your light in the heart of every man. Thanks for life. Thanks for faith. Thanks for love. I'm yours."

Farina died at home surrounded by his friends and family on April 24, 2009. Let us pray for him to intercede for all youth to find life, happiness, and love in God.

Domestic Church Project – a website for today's parents with simple and practical help to strengthen the faith within their family.

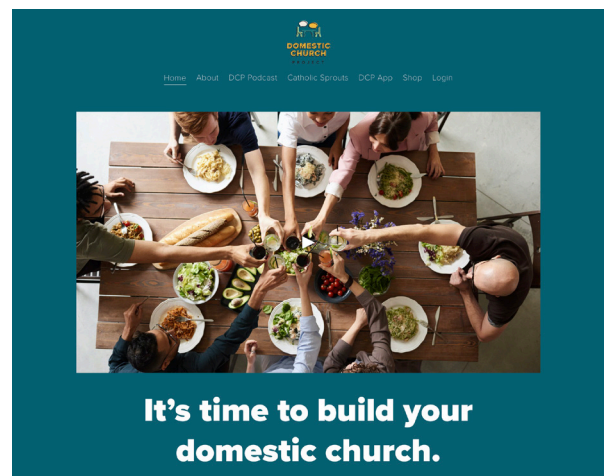

As we look with hope toward the end of the coronavirus pandemic, thousands of West Virginians are still reeling with the challenges the past year has presented.

“We are providing three times the assistance we did in comparison to last year at this time,” said Beth Zarate, Catholic Charities West Virginia (CCWVa) President and Chief Executive Officer.

Over the past year, CCWVa has seen many new families that have not previously needed food assistance or financial assistance.

For some of our clients, this temporary assistance is enough. However, some need

additional guidance, support and services. Catholic Charities is uniquely suited to help these individuals through our case management program and our continuum of services.

“The power of case management is that it empowers people to make lasting changes that lead to greater stability, and construct a pathway out of poverty based on their unique strengths,” said Zarate.

Catholic Charities takes a holistic and strengths-based approach to case management.

“Without Catholic Charities, I’d be lost,” said Mintie Ross, CCWVa client/neighbor. “I wouldn’t know how to do different things – like go to the store and buy cheaper stuff one way or another.”

Catholic Charities provides the support to help clients move toward opportunity. Materials supports may include transportation to appointments, fees for official documents (birth certificate, driver’s license, etc.), vehicle repair, uniform purchase, fees for workplace certifications, and more.

In Martinsburg, our case manager helped Reggie Smith and his family find housing and connected them to available community resources.

“I’m just so thankful that they [Catholic Charities] opened the door for us with a [first month’s rent] deposit,” said Smith. “I thank God for them. They gave me hope to keep pushing.”
