
WORLD DAY OF PRAYER FOR VOCATIONS



God is calling young men and women to the priesthood and religious life every day. Countless prayers are offered for an increase of laborers to the Church – laborers with Christ. On this Fourth Sunday of Easter, let us be completely present as we unite our voices in prayer with the faithful from across the globe on World Day of Prayer for Vocations.

"The Lord's call – is the loving initiative whereby God encounters us and invites us to be part of a great undertaking. He opens before our eyes the horizon of a greater sea and an abundant catch," Pope Francis said.

St. Junipero Serra, canonized by Pope Francis on Sept. 23, 2015, is the patron saint of vocations

to Church ministry. A group of lay Catholics, men and women of all ages and backgrounds, called Serrans, are dedicated to promoting and fostering vocations. CATHOLIC SCHOOLS OF WV Excited for One Mission One Day

The Catholic Schools in West Virginia have more than 4,195 reasons to motivate you to make a difference on May 4th.

All 18 grade schools and six high schools will be participating in a 24-hour online state-wide giving day - One Mission One Day to Make a Difference.

Principals and advancement directors have been working together to coordinate creative social media ideas, fun promotions, and friendly competitions that 400-plus staff, 4,195 students, and their dedicated families are excited to promote. All the funds will be directed by the individual schools

for areas they declare like tuition assistance, school improvements, special programs, or technology upgrades. Organizers in the schools are excited for this opportunity to reach family and friends from near and far online to raise funds and spread school pride.

"As each one has received a gift, use it to serve one another as good stewards of God's varied grace" (1 Peter 4:10).

One Mission One Day was originally created by the school advancement directors and principals of the Northern Panhandle Catholic schools in 2019. In 2020, One Mission

One Day raised more than \$234,000 with 19 schools participating. These gifts were greatly appreciated and crucial for our schools' budgets during the stay-at-home order when all other fundraising events were cancelled.

Donors, who contribute this year will go to www.OneMissionOneDay.org and select which school(s) their contributions benefit. Their donations will go directly to the school or schools of their choice.

"It's going to be an exciting day to follow on social media," Heidi Sforza of the Stewardship and Development Office said. "So, make sure you check in on your local Catholic schools and alma mater's Facebook pages from 12:01AM to 11:59 PM on May 4th. They'll be tracking their progress, sharing photos, and posting video messages to you. Every contribution, no matter the dollar amount, count and do make a difference!"

Organizers from the individual schools are eager too to see which school will raise the most money and which will have the most donors, because those schools will each receive a \$500 gift from the WV Catholic Foundation.

St. Catherine of Siena ~ Pray for Us

On April 29 we celebrate the memorial of St. Catherine of Siena, Italy.

Her thoughts and teachings are captured in *The Dialogue on Saint Catherine of Siena*, which she simply called, "my book." She left all of her writings in the hands of Blessed Raymond Capua, who published them in *The Dialogue*. He also wrote The *Life of St. Catherine of Siena*, a biography of her life based on their conversations.

He shared that from a young age she would have visions of saints, angels, and Jesus. Her first was when she was six. She was out with her little brother Stephen, when she abruptly stopped, because she became captivated by a vision of Jesus with St. Peter, St. Paul, and St. John the Evangelist. She said Jesus smiled at her and blessed her. Capua wrote, "From this moment Catherine seemed to be no longer a child; her virtues her manners, and her thoughts were superior to her age, and would have done honor to men of mature years. The first of divine love inflamed her heart and enlightened her understanding; her will strengthened, her memory developed, and her every action became conformed to the rules of the Gospel."

She would write that God said to her, "I loved you without being loved by you, even before you existed (in fact it was love that moved me to create you in my own image and likeness).... But you must give this love to other people, loving them without being loved by them. You must love them without any concern for your own spiritual or material profit, but only for the glory and praise of my name,

because I love them."

Saint Catherine was a layperson in the Third Order Dominicans, a female group of dedicated to prayer and charity serving the poor and sick. She became a voice for peace and order in the Church. As a spiritual director for common people, rovals, and governmental leaders, popes even sought her



guidance. Blessed Capua said her words can come across as soft and gentle like a child, but also profound like a great prophet.

He wrote of her childhood, "She was loved by all who saw her.... Her neighbors and relatives would bring her to their houses in order to listen to her child-like reasonings and enjoy her infantine sweetness." They nicknamed her "Euphrosyne," which means joy in Greek. He goes on to write, "As soon as one conversed with her, sadness was dispelled from the heart, vexations and troubles were forgotten, and a ravishing peace took possession of the soul, so extraordinary indeed that one could only imagine it to resemble that enjoyed by the Apostles on Mount Tabor, when one exclaimed, 'It is good for us to be here!'"

She is honored as a Doctor of the Church for contributing and strengthening the Church through her prayers and spiritual writings.



St. Joseph the Worker Pray for Us

As we honor St. Joseph the Worker on this feast May 1st, let us remember him as a great example of how to be a dedicated, loving, and humble worker, father, and spouse.

He worked with dignity in all those roles not only to provide, but for God. He worked with our Blessed Mother to raise, nurture, and teach Jesus. He tirelessly worked to honor Mary and protect her and the Son of God, especially when they had to escape danger time and time again.

Look to St. Joseph and let him teach all of us how to work for God, family, and community. As the patron of the universal Church and our diocese, he watches over the faithful. Ask him to intercede and obtain mercy and courage for us, while defending us from all evil.

From Retired Chef to Valued Kitchen Volunteer

On Monday mornings at the Catholic Charities Neighborhood Center in Wheeling, you can find Barbara Gabis in the kitchen preparing meals for those in need.

When Barbara retired as a chef, she offered her talents to the staff at the Catholic Charities Neighborhood Center.



"Barbara's warmth and good humor are very much appreciated by the staff and volunteers the kitchen at the Neighborhood Center," said Mark Phillips, Catholic Charities West Virginia (CCWVa) Northern Regional Director. "Her generosity

supporting the work of her friends in the kitchen makes a big difference as we prepare meals for neighbors and those to whom we deliver."

According to Barbara, the kitchen is her comfort zone. She loves working in the kitchen and applying her passion for culinary arts to filling the need she sees in her community. And CCWVa Kitchen Manager Betty Simeth says Barbara is an invaluable member of the volunteer team.

In November 2020, Barbara made a \$10,000 donation to the Neighborhood Center in memory of her late husband, Dr. Joe Gabis.

"I thought the best way to honor Joe for the one year anniversary of his death was to make a donation," said Barbara. "He was

a man of faith and an example to us all. He really believed in giving back."

The donation was used to purchase equipment for the Catholic Charities Neighborhood Center kitchen.

"I've worked in kitchens. I know when you have the best equipment, you work more efficiently," said Barbara.

With this donation, CCWVa purchased hot boxes to keep prepared meals warm before serving; new shelving and kitchen racks to store food more efficiently; a new commercial grade microwave; portion control serving utensils; and numerous other items that enable kitchen staff and volunteers to work more effectively.

"Barbara is a faithful volunteer in our kitchen at the

Neighborhood Center who is always willing to work hard to keep our neighbors well fed," said Trish Whitelatch, Catholic Charities Neighborhood Center Assistant Coordinator.

"Barbara's efforts have continued throughout the pandemic as she moved from dinner service to meal


