




World Day of Prayer for Vocations

April 30th is 60th World Day of Prayer for Vocations!

God is calling young men and women to vocations to honor Christ by our lives, words, and actions every day.



The Church concentrates this day on vocations to the ordained ministries (priesthood and diaconate), consecrated life in all its forms (male and female religious life, societies of apostolic life, consecrated virginity), secular institutes in their diversity of services and membership, and to the missionary life.

Let us be completely present on this Fourth Sunday of Easter, joining our voices in offering countless prayers around the world for an increase of laborers to the Church – laborers with Christ.

"The Lord's call – is the loving initiative whereby God encounters us and invites us to be part of a great undertaking. He opens before our eyes the horizon of a greater sea and an abundant catch," Pope Francis said.

St. Junipero Serra, canonized by Pope Francis on Sept. 23, 2015, is the patron saint of vocations to Church ministry. A group of lay Catholics, men and women of all ages and backgrounds, called Serrans, are dedicated to promoting and fostering vocations. May a Month to Celebrate Mary Our Blessed Mother

May! What a beautiful month to honor our Blessed Mother Mary, Queen of Heaven – Our Lady of Peace.



In West Virginia, the gorgeous colors of our hills and valleys come alive. Dogwoods, rhododendrons, sassafras, and sugar maples awaken. The sweet fragrance of lily of the valley, and peony fill the air.

We have been celebrating Mary during the month of May since the early Church. While there are beautiful formal prayers to honor the Blessed Virgin Mary, this one-line, prayerful plea, recited habitually throughout the day by St. Teresa of Calcutta is beautiful and heartfelt in its simplicity:

"Mary, Mother of Jesus, please be a mother to me now."

Mary is perfect example of true and loving discipleship. As she offered Jesus and the disciples her prayers and motherly love, she offers us the same through her intercessions. We honor her and her role as being chosen to the Mother of God. We pray for her intercession through the Hail Mary, the rosary, novenas, and litanies among others.

Mary Altar

From May 1 to May 31, dedicate a small area of your home for a Mary Altar. Think of it as a little prayer spot, showcasing your favorite items that remind you of Our Blessed Mother. You can start with a sweet statue or artwork of Mary and then add flowers, your rosary(s), and a candle. If you have children, let them help direct what to place in this space. Show off their drawings of her and maybe even write down a personal prayer asking for her intercession.

Let this designated area be one that is a visible reminder of the Holy Mother of God, her importance in our lives and in the life of the Church.

"Mary is close, she can hear us, she can help us, she is close to every one of us," said Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI.

Resources to Honor Mary this Month

The best way to celebrate Mary is to call upon her in prayer, formally with the Hail Mary, the Angelus, and the Rosary (all found at FAITHINWV.ORG).

Also think a little outside the box - step out in style! Wear blue in honor of Mary. Maybe donning some fun socks with her image or a graphic tee (see options below)? Maybe consider adding a hand carved Madonna statue made in our region. Have fun being creative in your Marian celebration this month.

BISHOP GILBERT SHELDON, FORMER SHEPHERD OF THE DIOCESE OF STEUBENVILLE, REMEMBERED

STEUBENVILLE — The Diocese of Steubenville's third bishop, Gilbert I. Sheldon died April 24 at the age of 96. Bishop Sheldon served as a bishop for 26 years, 16 as an auxiliary in Cleveland and 10 as diocesan bishop in Steubenville.

Diocese of Steubenville Bishop Jeffrey M. Monforton said, "Bishop Sheldon personified a shepherd's generosity and compassionate heart. His love for the people of God was evident in his travels throughout the diocese as he shared

the good news of Jesus Christ. As his episcopal motto illustrated, he was strong in the faith."

Bishop Sheldon was born Sept. 20, 1926, in Cleveland, one of 12 children of the late Ignatius P. and Stephanie J. Olszewski Sheldon. He is survived by his sisters, Susan (Hans) Gossler of Munster, Indiana and Nancy A. Sheldon of Rocky River, Ohio.

He received his early education in Cleveland and enlisted in the U.S. Army Air Force, as an aviation cadet, upon graduation from high school in 1944.

Bishop Sheldon then went on to receive degrees from John Carroll University and St. Mary Seminary, both in Cleveland, and the Ohio Consortium of Seminaries,



Columbus, Ohio. In addition, Bishop Sheldon has been awarded honorary degrees from Wheeling Jesuit University, Wheeling, West Virginia, and Franciscan University of Steubenville.

He was ordained to the priesthood Feb. 28, 1953, by Diocese of Cleveland Archbishop Edward F. Hoban.

On June 11, 1976, he was ordained a bishop by Bishop, and later Cardinal, James A. Hickey. As an auxiliary bishop for the Cleveland Diocese, Bishop Sheldon was the vicar, Marriage and Family Concerns;

vicar, Summit County; and vicar, Southern Region.

On April 2, 1992, he was installed as the bishop of the Diocese of Steubenville. During that time, he served on U.S. bishops' committees for Latin America, Administration, National Advisory Council, Missions and Nominations, as well as a board member of the Pontifical College Josephinum, Columbus.

Visitation for Bishop Sheldon will be held at Holy Rosary Church, Steubenville, May 1, 9am-4pm and 7-9pm; vigil service is scheduled for 7pm. A funeral Mass will be celebrated at 11am, May 2 at Holy Rosary Church. Burial will take place following Mass.

WV HOPE SCHOLARSHIP Application Deadline is May 15

The Department of Catholic Schools in the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston confirmed its 24 schools across West Virginia are receiving many inquiries the Hope Scholarship program since the application process opened this spring. They are reminding interested families that the state's deadline for the program is May 15, cautioning that folks cannot wait until the last minute to apply because documentation is needed by the WV Treasure's office in order to process the applications.

The West Virginia Hope Scholarship (WVHS) is run by the WV Treasure Riley Moore's Office and can be used towards tuition and fees for non-public schools and home schools in the state. This scholarship is not run, managed, or determined by the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston or the Department of Catholic Schools in the Diocese. The website created by the state for the scholarship is: <u>HOPESCHOLARSHIPWV.COM</u>

The site declares, "Hope Scholarship is the state's education savings account program that gives parents an opportunity to build an individual learning experience that works best for their child. The scholarship allows K-12 students to receive financial assistance that can be used for tuition, fees and other expenses."

According to Moore's office, under the current school aid formula, each eligible student would receive \$4,488.82 for the 2023-2024 school year to use toward private school, alternative instruction programs, or home school. The amount is for each student and is not determined by income.

The state stipulates that money in the Hope Scholarship education savings account will be administered and through a third party and released by the parent/guardian for state approved expenses. All purchases would be pre-approved by the state. Beyond tuition, the funds awarded can be spent on special services, transportation, extracurriculars, tutoring, materials, supplies, textbooks, transportation, etc.

Blessed Sandra Sabattini ~ the Holy Fiancee



Sandra Sabattini had a grateful and giving heart because she was grounded in Christ. She let others see Christ in her – a God that loves and shows mercy for all even those who feel unlovable. She is the first engaged woman to be beatified. We remember her on May 2, the anniversary of her death.

She was a medical student, engaged to the young man of her dreams, and was a member of a group, the Pope John XXIII Community, that served youth, poor, sick, and those with drug additions.

She kept a diary from the time she was 10. In it we learn her thoughts – "Life lived without God is just a way of passing time... boring or fun, time to be filled in while waiting for death."

Blessed Sandra didn't claim to be perfect by any means. In her own words she describes her struggles, and challenges with character and acceptance. She would often talk to her peers and others of the need to not only to avoid evil but also to aim for greatness. "Today there are too many merely good Christians, while the world needs saints," she wrote.

Her diary entries and miscellaneous notes were published by her priest friend Fr. Oreste Benzi after her death. Blessed Sandra died from injuries sustained after she was hit by a car on her way to her community meeting at the age of 22 on May 2, 1984.

Not long before she had told her mother she had a dream about dying. Two days before her accident she wrote this in her diary:

"This life is not mine that is evolving rhythmically by a regular breath that is not mine, enlivened by a peaceful day that is not mine. There is nothing in this world that is yours. Be aware of this! It is all a gift that the 'Giver' can act on whenever and however He wants. Take care of the gift you have been given, make it more beautiful and fuller for when the time comes."

That quote illustrates Blessed Sandra's belief that everything is a gift from God, who intervenes in his time and how he wants to. Our job is to take care of the gift of life and nurturing not only our souls, but also to make things better for others – when we do our best we are preparing for when the time comes that we leave this earth.

When ready to register for her high-school equivalency testing, she found that no testing was scheduled where she lived. The Catholic Charities team facilitated her registration at a site in McDowell County. Brittani drove over two hours to complete her testing.

Her efforts paid off! Brittani passed the High School Equivalency exam. She is continuing her journey and is now enrolled in Mountwest's Radiology program.


Ss Philip and James the Less ~ Pray for Us

The feast of Saints Philip and James on May 3rd is a day to celebrate two men who chose to be followers of Christ and upon the Resurrection went out into the world to preach the gospel.

Jesus chose both men to be his apostles. Philip is mentioned in the gospel of John. He tells us Philip was from Bethsaida (the same as Andrew and Peter) and was the third man approached by Christ to "Follow me." He was also the apostle that went to Nathanael and affirmed Jesus was indeed the Messiah "We have found the one about whom Moses wrote in the law, and also the prophets, Jesus, son of Joseph, from Nazareth (John 1:43-51)."

James, who was also called "James the Less," was either younger or smaller than the other Apostle named James. His mother was close to our Blessed Mother and stood with her at the cross. Christ appeared to James after His Resurrection. After Christ's Ascension it was James who went out to begin the Christian church community in Jerusalem. He was the author of the first Epistle and was then referred to as "James the Just." St. Paul calls him one of the pillars of our faith. In his letter (James 5:13-20) he writes about the significance our role in the faith is by specifically addressing the power of prayer, confession, intercession, and conversion.

Both men were martyred for the faith. Even though they did



not die at the same time or place the Church honors these men together, because their remains/relics were moved and buried at the Basilica of the 12 Holy Apostles in Rome, on the same day.

Lord, give us the confidence and loyalty of these great saints in order to have a positive influence in your name in this world. AMEN

SAINT DOMINIC A CHAMPION FOR CHILDREN

Saint Dominic Savio is a champion for children. The Church honors him on his feast day May 6. He died a month shy of his 15th birthday.

Saint John "Don" Bosco, who taught St. Dominic, wrote a book about his beloved pupil- *The Life* of *Dominic Savio*. In it he notes this quote that wraps up the mindset

of St. Dominic, "I am not capable of doing big things, but I want to do everything. Even the smallest things for the greater glory of God."

Bosco was St. Dominic's teacher at the Oratory of St. Francis De Sales School and Youth Center. He said young Dominic took Bosco's lessons and sermons seriously, specifically that we are all called to be saints. Bosco preached that, "Everyone is called to be a saint, and do you know, it is easy to be a saint. Just do this: diligently do the ordinary things of the day in an extra ordinary way."

Saint Dominic responded to that by saying, "From now on, I am going to be very serious about becoming a saint." Advised by Bosco, Saint Dominic became a loyal "cheerful giver," because Bosco would tell him, "Keep in mind that the Lord, Jesus is always with you and wants your happiness."

About ten months before his death Dominic confided to Saint Don Bosco: "Father, I desire to do something for Mary, but I must do it at once. I want to share my love for the Blessed Mother with my companions. What can I do?" Together they agreed to start a group of students interested in promoting devotion to Mary, the Immaculate Mother of Jesus, and the good of the Oratory.

On December 6, 1876 nineteen years after his death Dominic appeared to Don Bosco. Dominic came to encourage and to advise Don Bosco about the future of his work for youth. In that vision Don Bosco asked his pupil, "Dominic, what gave you the most comfort at the hour of death?"

"What comforted me most at the point of death was the assistance of the powerful and loving Mother of God."

Teen Leadership for Life Weekend Set for Summer 2023

West Virginians for Life have announced the 2023 Leadership for Life weekend for teens.

The second annual *WV Teens for Life* "Leadership for Life" weekend will be August 25-27 in Parsons, WV.

This event is open to all 13–17-year-olds (high school) Catholic or non-Catholic – and has the minimal fee of \$25,

The program will be led by WVFL Board Member Riley Keaton and his wife Sadie, Legislative Director for WVFL.

The *Leadership for Life* weekend will be focused on leadership skills mingled with traditional summer camping activities.

"Our passion for protecting life from womb to tomb brought Riley and I together," Sadie Keaton said. "I can't wait to share the beauty and purpose of the pro-life movement with young people."



The Keatons have served the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston in administrative roles for Camp Carlo Catholic adventure camp. Teens for Life leadership weekend will be held at Horseshoe Run in Parsons, WV. In addition to training and motiving peers to save lives in the pro-life movement, participants will also enjoy summer camping fun like rock climbing, campfires, hiking, swimming, archery, arts, and crafts, and more.

"First of all, we're going to have an awesome time," Riley Keaton said, and added that purpose and mission will be woven into all activities. "Our real focus is on the pro-life movement. What are the best strategies for changing hearts on abortion? How can we be pro-life every day? How can we contribute our leadership to build the culture of life from womb to tomb? It's going to be an incredible experience for any young person."

The Keatons said last year's leadership camp was a great success.

"In between rock climbing, canoeing, and more, students dove headfirst into four concepts: Effective Education, Industry Impact, Public Policy, and Supportive Services," he said.

Teens who attend the camp will focus on respect for life at all stages, but will also learn how important their role is, as well as how they can make a difference in their communities.

Like last year, the students will discuss and design projects they can do within their churches, groups, schools, etc. Further they will hear from the Keatons on their unique perspectives. Riley serves as a WV Delegate and Sadie will share her experiences not only as a legislative liaison for WVFL, but also how she got involved years ago with Teens for Life.
