



ON DECEMBER 6TH, CELEBRATE FATHER CHRISTMAS ST. NICHOLAS DAY

His story began 1,750 ago. He was born in 270 AD in the Greek village of Patara in Asia Minor (part of what is now Turkey between the Mediterranean and Black seas). His parents died, when Nicholas was still a boy. He inherited great wealth, however, he used it all to help the poor and sick. He dedicated himself as a servant of God, knowing his parents would be proud. They were the ones who instilled in him the love of Jesus and unwavering faith.



He served as the Bishop of Myra and was not only known for his generosity to those in need and his love of children, but also for sailors and maritime workers. Because of the region he lived, he knew the hardships and of those who made their livelihood on the rough seas.

Around 325 AD, Bishop Nicholas, argued at the Council of Nicaea that the doctrine of the Holy Trinity be an integral part of the faith. The council's statement from that time has become part of the Nicene Creed we still say in our churches today. The good saint died on Dec. 6, 343, AD.

Throughout the world Saint Nicholas is remembered as a religious and a giver.

Consider taking time to act like St. Nicholas and donate food to a food pantry, donate shoes to a local shelter, or ask your local hospital about donating toys and activities for children spending the holidays there.

Saint Nicholas day is a great day to experience the joy of giving and performing good deeds.

For the little ones in your life, on the eve of this feast day, share the Saint Nicholas story with them and that night place small treats in their shoes (slippers). Common surprises include coins, chocolate, clementines, prayer cards, candy canes, a Christmas ornament, etc.- simple gifts of sweet love and thoughtfulness, which is exactly what Bishop Nicholas has been celebrated for since 800 AD.

HONOR OUR RETIRED RELIGIOUS ~ DEC. 12-13

During Advent we reflect on our faith and preparing for the coming of the Lord. Next weekend, we are asked to consider, remember and honor our retired religious through the Retirement Fund for Religious (RFR) national collection. The collection will take place Dec. 12-13, and benefits Catholic sisters, brothers, and priests in religious orders.

Bishop Mark E. Brennan shared a letter with the faithful in the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston on Nov. 24th asking for support of the national collection for retired religious.

"If any national collection could be considered 'popular,' both in the sense of 'well regarded' and in that of being 'of the people' this one surely is," he wrote. "Many of us have fond memories of religious sisters and brothers who taught us or religious priests who served in our parishes and cared for our families. Now they are elderly and sometimes frail and sick and have had to withdraw from active ministry. It is our turn to serve them."

In West Virginia we have 20 religious communities serving in all reaches of the state.

While ongoing Covid-19 concerns mean that many in our parishes across the country are unable to attend Mass; and

the profound economic impact the pandemic has had on our parishes has been straining; please, know any contribution no matter how great or small is accepted with heartfelt gratitude,

said Sister Stephanie Still, PBVM, Executive Director of RFR.

"We hold you in our prayers, and we ask you to hold our mission for elderly religious in yours," she said.

Donations are tax-deductible donation offer vital support for elderly sisters, brothers,

and religious order priests, helping to provide prescription medications, nursing care, and more. It also helps religious communities implement retirement strategies that promote quality eldercare and continued service to the People of God.

The collection has been part of our Advent donations since 1988, when the Catholic bishops in the United States deemed it necessary to help the well over 500 religious orders here. It's important to note that only 29 of those have what is considered adequate retirement funding.



ADDRESSING FOOD DESERTS IN WEST VIRGINIA

Building on the foundation of feeding the hungry, food programs have always been a core piece of Catholic Charities West Virginia's (CCWVa) work to fulfill its mission.

In recent years, the closures of grocery stores throughout Appalachia have led to limited access to fresh produce and other healthy whole foods for many West Virginians. These 'food deserts' are defined by the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) as "low-income census tracts where a substantial number or share of residents has low access to a supermarket or large grocery store."

CCWVa's unique approach to addressing this issue is through a Mobile Food Pantry – a van loaded with pantry foods that travels to remote areas to distribute food to individuals and families who qualify as low-income.

CCWVa's Mobile Outreach travels to the West Virginia counties of Calhoun, Doddridge, Ritchie, Roane and Wirt. Within this specific area, poverty rates range between 15.0% and 20.9%. CCWVa clients in these areas have reported that they travel 40 miles or more across mountainous roads to reach a supermarket.

Throughout the coronavirus pandemic, procedures have been

adapted to keep staff, volunteers and clients safe. Food pantry boxes are pre-packed and loaded into clients' cars.

Tonya, a client from Wirt County, said:

"The COVID-19 virus led to a terrible time for my family. My husband lost his job as the company suspended operations.

Money was extremely tight and the shelves were empty. We had very little food and very few resources to get more. I was in a panic.

Thankfully, the (Catholic Charities Mobile Outreach) coordinator called me to check on me and my family, and also to let me know that the food pantry would be giving away food on its regularly scheduled day.

He also let me know where more food and resources were available. On the pantry day there was enough food available to feed my family for a week.

While other pantries were shut down or delayed, Catholic Charities continued to serve us as always. I will be eternally grateful."

In addition to food distribution, the CCWVa Mobile Outreach also offers a variety of enrichment activities, including health insurance enrollment, Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) enrollment, and cooking demonstrations.

Our parishes, schools, and organizations' budgets have suffered with the sparse parish collections, cancelled fundraisers, and postponed appeals. SECOND SUNDAY OF ADVENT

First Reading ISAIAH 40:1-5, 9-11

Comfort, give comfort to my people, says your God. Speak tenderly to Jerusalem, and proclaim to her that her service is at an end, her guilt is expiated; indeed, she has received from the hand of the LORD double for all her sins. A voice cries out: In the desert prepare the way of the LORD! Make straight in the wasteland a highway for our God! Every valley shall be filled in, every mountain and hill shall be made low; the rugged land shall be made a plain, the rough country, a broad valley. Then the glory of the LORD shall be revealed, and all people shall see it together; for the mouth of the LORD has spoken. Go up on to a high mountain, Zion, herald of glad tidings; cry out at the top of your voice, Jerusalem, herald of good news! Fear not to cry out and say to the cities of Judah: Here is your God!
