
Honoring Marriage ~ Happily Even After World Marriage Day ~ Feb. 12

Marriage is a vocation. The Church celebrates that vocation to holiness, calling all couples to keep their relationship Christ-centered in order to balance life.

God knows it is not easy. It's hard to stay married in a society, where it's so easy to quit. I wished everyone engaged or about to be married would hear the words a dear pastor said to my friends at their wedding, "There is NO ONE on this earth that can make you happier than your spouse." You could hear a few people whisper, "Aww."

Then after his pause he said, "BUT there is also no one on this earth that can make you more annoyed, angry, or hurt than your spouse."

That shocked a few, but it's the truth. Isn't it?

Stop there! Now – reverse what the pastor said and take ownership – YOU are the one who can make your spouse the happiest. AND YOU are the one who can hurt them more than anyone.

We can't teach our children to think marriage is a "happily ever after." A good marriage is a happily EVEN after.

Even after a great day of work when your spouse had an awful day.

Even after you face financial struggles, and they just seem to compound.

Even after you have a strong difference of opinion – especially if it has to do about raising your children if you have been so blessed.

Even after you have a job loss or can't seek the job you want, because it's not the right fit for your family's needs.

Even after...I could go on and on, but you get the picture.

Marriage is a lot of give and take – accepting that most of the time you are going to be the giver. Not saying here that you have to totally lose yourself - quite the opposite. Be so confident in yourself, God, and your love that the reason you freely give your love, time, sweat, and prayer is because you recognize your spouse as a blessing.

God gave them specifically to you.

So, know there is no magic potion or check list – but there is a key. The key is to keep Christ as the center of your life. When you do this, and when you absolutely do this together – you win!

You get that "Happily Even After."

With that let's end with a prayer adapted from the book *Prayers for Married Couples* by Renee Bartkowski, I received at my Engaged Encounter in 1993 lead by Monsignor Dean Borgmeyer:

We want to realize, Lord, that having a good life together depends on our wiliness to always choose the right attitudes.

We can choose to concentrate on the good things in our marriage or to be preoccupied with the bad.

We can choose to see only the faults in our loved ones or to be more aware of their virtues.

We can choose to react to situations in our relationship with kindness and generosity or with selfishness and resentment; with anger and revenge or with forgiveness and understanding.

We can choose to face life with a positive outlook and a good sense of humor or with a negative point of view and a chip on our shoulder.

Remind us Lord, that we each possess the power to make our lives and our marriage as happy and enjoyable as we want to make them or as difficult and unpleasant as we desire.

It is up to us. Help us, Lord, to always make the right choices. Amen.

FIND TRUE HAPPINESS IN THE BLESSED SACRAMENT LET US LOVE CHRIST AS ST. CLAUDE DE LA COLOMBIERE

Do we go to God before complaining to others? Do we seek the happiness Christ has for us in the Eucharist? Do we spend time in Adoration and share our whole heart with Him?



Saint Claude de la Colombière wants to hear your resounding "Yes" to all of those questions. The Jesuit priest born in the mid 17th Century was known encouraging people to be active in their faith and take full advantage of the gifts God provides us

through the Eucharist, prayer, and a relationship with Christ.

His sermons and spiritual advice are part of several publications including, The Spiritual Direction of Saint Claude de la Colombière, where he reminds and challenges us - "Jesus is in the midst of us in the Blessed Sacrament. What a con¬solation to live in the same house where he dwells! Yet does it not often seem as though we ignored this happiness? Do we often visit him? Do we go to him in our needs and consult him in our plans? Do we bring him our little sorrows instead of talking about them and complaining and murmuring to others?"

He was adamant in his sermons to always speak about God's love and mercy.

"As Jesus Christ possesses your whole heart, he wishes also to have all your anxieties and all your thoughts," he said. "Think of him and trust in his goodness for all the rest. You will see that he will make all things right when you think only of his interests."

Saint Claude was also the champion for the Sacred Heart of Jesus devotion. Saint Margaret Mary Alacoque described him as the "faithful servant and perfect friend" Jesus promised her.



It was Saint Margaret Mary, who between 1673-1675, had visions of Jesus and was told by Christ to spread the devotion to the Sacred Heart, encourage the faithful to receive the Eucharist frequently, and spend time with Christ in Adoration. When she

told her congregation and other religious of her visions, they doubted her and considered her "stories" an annoyance.

Father Claude, who by this time was very accomplished as a priest, had taught in college, and was in charge of several Marian congregations; was seemingly out of nowhere sent to serve the Monastery of the Visitation where Margaret Mary was.

He was her rector and spiritual director. He was also the one who believed her and helped her elevate the devotion to the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus to the world.

In honor of his feast day Feb. 15, we share with you his Prayer of Friendship to Jesus:

Jesus, you are my true friend, my only friend.

You take a part in all my misfortunes;

You take them on yourself;

You know how to change them into blessings.

You listen to me with the greatest kindness when I relate my troubles to you,

and you always have balm to pour on my wounds.

I find you at all times, I find you everywhere,

You never go away;

if I have to change my dwelling, I find you wherever I go.

You are never weary of listening to me,

You are never tired of doing me good.

I am certain of being beloved by you if I love you;

my goods are nothing to you,

and by bestowing yours on me you never grow poor.

However miserable I may be,

no one nobler or wiser or even holier

can come between you and me,

and deprive me of your friendship;

and death, which tears us away from all other friends,

will unite me forever to you.

All the humiliation attached to old age

or to the loss of honor will never detach you from me.

On the contrary, I shall never enjoy you more fully,

and you will never be closer to me'

than when everything seems to conspire against me,

to overwhelm me, and to cast me down.

You bear with all my faults with extreme patience,

and even my want of fidelity and ingratitude

do not wound you to such a degree

as to make you unwilling to receive me back

when I return to you.

Jesus, grant that I may die praising you,

that I may die loving you,

that I may die for the love of you.

Amen.

PROMOTING THE DIGNITY OF UKRAINIAN NEWCOMERS WITH AFFORDABLE LEGAL EXPERTISE



Catholic Charities West Virginia hosts a webinar about immigration options for Ukrainian newcomers.

The Catholic Charities West Virginia (CCWVa) Immigration Services program has a long history of providing high quality, affordable immigration legal services to West Virginia residents.

The majority of our state's newest residents are arriving from Ukraine via the Uniting for Ukraine (U4U) program. The U4U program was established in April 2022 by the Department of Homeland Security in response to Russia's invasion of Ukraine. This program allows individuals in the United States to sponsor Ukrainians to stay in the United States for a two-year temporary period.

The CCWVa Refugee Resettlement program has been working closely

with many West Virginia-based sponsors and the new Ukrainian arrivals to support their resettlement in West Virginia. To date we have provided resettlement support to 42 Ukrainians in West Virginia.

Due to the nature of their temporary immigration status, many Ukrainian newcomers have expressed concerned about: "What next?"

To support the Ukrainian newcomers in West Virginia with answering this question, CCWVa hosted a webinar to introduce Ukrainians to the various next-step immigration options. The webinar was presented by four immigration attorneys: Kellie Rogers and Nicole Annan from CCWVa, Katy Lewis from Mountain State Justice, and Paul Saluja from Saluja Law.

The 90-minute webinar was presented in English and interpreted in Ukrainian, and covered topics related to asylum, family-based immigration applications, employment-based immigration applications, and other humanitarian options, such as victim of trafficking and victim of crime applications.

These four attorneys also offered free individualized consultations to each Ukrainian family to discuss their family's specific options.

CCWVa is proud to be able to embrace the Gospel's teaching of welcoming the stranger by providing resettlement support and legal expertise to many of West Virginia's newest arrivals.
