Created in the initial days of a national emergency, when the Church was closed due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the FaithInWV e-bulletin was a way to be together virtually, while away physically from our parish families.

As Bishop Mark Brennan said in our first issue, "We pledge to you to do our very best to stay connected and to continue to provide you spiritual resources and the assurance of our prayers," and that continues to be our commitment.

It was designed as a means of communication with the faithful to not only keep everyone informed, but also to help us all grow in faith by providing the Mass readings, prayer intentions, and online resources. In addition to including important announcements from Bishop Mark Brennan, letters from the Department of Catholic Schools Superintendent Mary Ann Deschaine, pandemic protocol, and liturgical guidelines, the online bulletin evolved to include our FaithInWV feature stories of inspiring WV Catholics, stories of saints, and highlights of feast days relevant for the week.

The e-bulletin, which is emailed to more than 12,500 people each week, was named after the #FaithInWV profile features showcased on our [FAITHINWV.ORG](https://www.faihtinwv.org) website and published monthly in The Catholic Spirit. Like its namesake, the e-bulletin content gives hope, helps us focus on our faith, and encourages each of us to lead by the example of great saints and disciples.

As a worship aid and evangelization resource the FaithInWV e-bulletin continues to be a means to help us to choose to find the good in our circumstances, and let others see Christ in us amidst a time of uncertainty and adversity. Ultimately, it is a tangible outlet to emphasize our faith in God and the Church.

You may not know me, but I know everything about you (*Psalm 139.1*). I know when you sit down and when you rise up (*Psalm 139.2*). I am familiar with all your ways (*Psalm 139.3*).

Even the very hairs on your head are numbered (*Matthew 10.29-31*). For you were made in my image (*Genesis 1.27*). In me you live and move and have your being (*Acts 17.28*).

For you are my offspring (*Acts 17.28*). I knew you even before you were conceived (*Jeremiah 1.4-5*). I chose you when I planned creation (*Ephesians 1.11-12*). You were not a mistake, for all your days are written in my book (*Psalm 139.15-16*). I determined the exact time of your birth and where you would live (*Acts 17.26*). You are fearfully and wonderfully made (*Psalm 139.14*).

St. Margaret Mary described St. Claude as the “faithful servant and perfect friend” Jesus promised her. As you read in the Oct. 10, 2021, edition of FaithInWV, Jesus appeared to St. Margaret Mary several times between 1673-1675. Sharing his love and revealing His Sacred Heart. When she told her congregation and other religious of her visions, she was met with a lot of doubt, annoyance, and opposition. However, her testimony was believed and supported by St. Claude la Colombière, her spiritual director and rector.

Today we share with you, Saint Claude’s Prayer of Friendship to Jesus. It reveals the unconditional love Christ has for us and St. Claude professed for Him:



Jesus, you are my true friend, my only friend.

You take a part in all my misfortunes;

You take them on yourself;

You know how to change them into blessings.

You listen to me with the greatest kindness

when I relate my troubles to you,

and you always have balm to pour on my wounds.

I find you at all times, I find you everywhere,

WHEN IT COMES TO CHILD CARE, IT TAKES A VILLAGE

“Everyone has made everything easy to understand, with zero stress added to an already stressful day-to-day life! I am super thankful this program exists.”

“Both of us being essential workers has kept us busy through the entire lockdown, and our daycare and your financial aid made that possible.”

“This service is a blessing.”

These anonymous quotes come from parents and guardians who rely on Catholic Charities West Virginia Child Care Resource Center (CCRC). This program, funded by the state, helps people break the cycle of poverty by easing the financial burden of child care while they work or go to school.

“We are so grateful for people around the state who support Catholic Charities and who ultimately make this work possible,” said Brittany Lucci, Director of the CCRC. “You don’t realize how much stress parents are under until you see their shoulders sag in relief when you tell them you can help them afford child care.”

But CCRC services touch lives beyond the parents. Child care providers can also receive training and support to meet the needs of children in their care.

“Brooke” turned to CCRC for extra support when she was asked to care for “Logan” in her at-home child care. Logan is 14 months old and suffers from Neonatal Abstinence Syndrome (NAS).

“After discussing his NAS diagnosis, they [CCRC] helped me find training for NAS babies so I could learn how to better care for him,” said Brooke. “They also provided some age-appropriate infant toys and a much-needed sturdy Sit-U-Up support to help him to sit upright.”

Logan is getting stronger and thriving both in his foster home and in Brooke’s care, due in large part to the help they received from CCRC. Brooke says, “It brings tears to my eyes when I think about how many people have collaborated for this one little baby boy.”




The Catholic Charities Child Care Resource Center assists families with the cost of child care

First Reading JEREMIAH 17:5-8

Thus says the LORD: Cursed is the one who trusts in human beings, whose strength is in flesh, whose heart turns away from the LORD. 
