

HONOR SAINT KATHARINE DREXEL Advocate for Social and Racial Justice

Strive to Mirror Her Compassion, Persistence, and Courage


A rainy grey sky loomed over St. Peter's Square on Oct. 1, 2000, but when Pope John Paul 11 announced the name, "Katharine Drexel" the audience of more than 300,000 people stood in awe as the sky opened, the sun came out, and a rainbow appeared. Katharine Drexel was declared a saint and the heavens rejoiced!

She is a saint for all people – Catholics and non-Catholics. She was an advocate for social justice - faith-filled, compassionate, persistent, determined, and generous.

How can we be more like her? Use our gifts to serve others and value the dignity of human life.

Saint Katharine was courageous in her desire to stop the plight of Native Americans and the unjust treatment of African Americans, who were far from free and being denied a quality education and constitutional rights. In her lifetime she began the congregation of the Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament and opened 145 missions, 50 schools for African Americans, 12 schools for Native Americans, and Xavier University of Louisiana, the first Catholic college for African Americans in the US. Historians said she spared no expense and made sure students had the best materials available.

It is true that St. Katharine was an heiress of great fortune stemming from her immigrant grandfather, who an artist switched gears and along with his sons became



the most prominent bankers in American history. It is also true that she inherited much more than money from her family, she grew up knowing that their fortune was indeed a blessing to be shared; and to keep God first through prayer, sacraments, and the social teaching of Jesus.

Her family opened the doors of their home several days a week to feed the poor, her older sister Elizabeth began a school for orphaned boys; and younger sister Louise worked to promote the rights of Native and African Americans like St. Katharine.

Her life spanned 96 years.

Those years were filled with pivotal historical events that definitely molded her character and motivated her calling – the Civil War, the assassination of President Abraham Lincoln, Jim Crow Laws, World War I, the Great Depression, World War II, and the beginning of the Cold War. She died in 1955, the same year Rosa Parks refused to give up her seat in the white section of a bus in Montgomery, Alabama.

She was always a social activist, but at the age of 31 became a nun. Without hesitation she lovingly accepted the vows of chastity, poverty, and obedience, adding a fourth vow of service to the "Indian and Black Races," she declared. Her congregation's purpose was to serve the Native American and African American people, nurturing them in the Catholic faith. Her entire worth,

an estimated \$20 million was spent on building her missions, schools, and even Catholic churches for Native Americans African and Americans.

Despite ridicule, threats and attacks anti-desegregation from groups, anti-Catholics, the Ku Klux Klan, and even within the Church and other faith communities, Drexel and her congregation forged ahead with their plans and convictions. continue...

"If we wish to serve God and love our neighbor well, we must manifest our joy in the service we render to Him and them. Let us open wide our hearts. It is joy which invites us. Press forward and fear nothing," she said.

In 1934, St. Katharine partnered with the NAACP for anti-lynching legislation. She did not waiver on her stance against bigotry and



ignorance that lead to unthinkable and unfair treatment of humankind. Instead, she did her best to practice patience in her resolve.

"Often in my desire to work for others I find my hands tied, something hinders my charitable designs, some hostile influence renders me powerless. My prayers seem to avail nothing, my kind acts are rejected, I seem to do wrong things when I am trying to do my best. In such cases I must not grieve. I am only treading in my Master's steps," she said.

On this Feast Day of St. Katherine Drexel, take a moment and learn about and support the congregation of religious sisters she founded Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament.

Christ is Present! Will you be? WV Eucharistic Congresses - Spring 2023

It is time to make plans to gather together as the faithful of the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston to celebrate Christ's Real Presence in the Eucharist. Registration for the Regional Eucharistic Congresses for the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston will begin March 1st at dwc.org.

The three regional congresses will feature a dynamic national speaker, engaging breakout session presenters, Adoration, inspiring prayer services, celebratory music, Blessed Carlo Acutis' Eucharistic miracles display, all culminating in Mass celebrated by Bishop Mark Brennan, and much more. The Eucharistic Congresses are for the faithful of all ages from school age on up. The whole family is encouraged to attend along with our clergy, religious, Catholic organizations, and schools.

Faithful across the state will have three locations to choose from – Charles Town, Wheeling, and Charleston – or may attend all three – each featuring a different keynote speaker.

These homegrown events are part of the National Eucharistic Revival, a three-year renewal of "the Church by enkindling a living relationship with the Lord Jesus Christ in the Holy Eucharist."

WHEN, WHERE, AND WHO WILL BE SPEAKING?

In Charles Town, April 21-22, will be Father Luke Spannagel, of the Diocese of Peoria.

Fr. Luke is a member of the team of National Eucharistic Preachers which is part of the National Eucharistic Revival of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops. Fr. Luke currently serves at the Cathedral and Heart of Peoria Parishes in Peoria, IL. After his undergraduate studies at the University of Illinois, he went on to seminary at Mt. St. Mary's in Emmitsburg, MD. He was ordained for the Diocese of Peoria in 2003 and has enjoyed assignments in campus ministry and parishes of all sizes. Fr. Luke has shared that his time each day in celebrating the Mass and praying during Eucharistic Adoration are the best parts of his day.

In Wheeling, April 28-29, will be Fr. Timothy Anastos, of the Archdiocese of Chicago. Fr. Tim was ordained a priest in 2017. He is currently the associate chaplain of the St. John Paul II Newman Center at the University of Illinois-Chicago in addition to being a Eucharistic Preacher of the USCCB. He is also the host of Reel Homilies - minute-long YouTube, Instagram and TikTok reflections on the Sunday Gospel readings where he speaks through the lenses of Church tradition, pop culture, and self-improvement. In Charleston, June 2-3, will be Fr. Joe Freedy. Father Joe grew up in Pittsburgh. He was the starting quarterback for the University at Buffalo for 3 years. After college he entered the seminary and was assigned to study in Rome at the Gregorian University and the John Paul II Institute. He was ordained a Priest in 2008. Fr. Joe served as the vocation director for 8 years and is currently the Assistant Director of Evangelization for the Diocese of Pittsburgh and the Senior Assistant at Divine Mercy Parish. He is president of Dry Bones Ministries, a grassroots evangelization ministry in the Pittsburgh diocese that re-evangelizes God's people with an emphasis on the treasures of the Church like Holy Mass, the Holy Rosary, the Divine Mercy Chaplet and prayers for healing (WWW.DRYBONESPGH.ORG).

At all three events - the keynote will not only address the

entire congress with an uplifting talk about the Eucharist, but will also take part in a Q&A conversation during the weekend. The keynote along with a panel of breakout session presenters will bring the message to life, reviving our spirits, energizing our hearts, and give us confidence share Christ with others as a Eucharistic people.

IS MY PARISH, SCHOOL, OR ORGANIZATION INVOLVED?

Yes! Bishop Mark Brennan is calling all of us together to celebrate Christ's real presence and to see the faithful fully alive. "Believe what Christ said at the Last Supper, "This is my Body. This is my Blood!" This has been Bishop Mark Brennan's emboldening message to the faithful during his ministry here in the diocese and as a young parish priest.

Saturday morning will open with a Welcome and Prayer Service that celebrates our six vicariates. Parishes, schools, and other Catholic organizations will bring their prayer intentions in a special Eucharistic Congress Book of Prayer. Each group will be announced as their Book of Prayer is presented to Bishop Brennan to offer them in prayer throughout the Congresses.

The retreat is free, and lodging and meals will be provided. The Retreat will begin at 4:00 pm on Friday, March 17, and conclude after Mass and dinner at 1 pm on Sunday, March 19.

The Dominican Sisters of Peace has had a strong presence in the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston. Sister Ellen Dunn, O.P., served West Virginia as the director of the Office of Consecrated Life for 13 years. Sister Ellen retired after her 60th jubilee in 2021. She has returned to the motherhouse in Columbus.

Currently the congregation has eight women in "formation" to become religious Sisters, including scientists, communications professionals, medical professionals and even a former prison guard. All these women share a call to serve God's people as Dominican Sisters.

Women attending this "Come and See" retreat will meet these women and learn more about their journey and choice, as well as spend time with other Sisters, in prayer, study, meals, conversation and (of course) time for fun.

Dominican Sisters of Peace, members of the Order of Preachers, are vowed Catholic women who strive to spread the Gospel of Christ and advance the Kingdom of God through lives of service and peace-making. The Dominican Sisters of Peace are present in 22 states and Nigeria. The Sisters serve God's people in many ways, including education, health care, spirituality, pastoral care, prison ministry, the arts, and care of creation. There are 340 sisters and more than 300 lay associates affiliated with the congregation.
