


BISHOP BRENNAN TO SPEAK AT WHEELING'S MARTIN LUTHER KING CELEBRATION PRAYER SERVICE

Making dinary Time Extraordinary!

It's time for our priests to don the green, as we say hello to Mark in our Sunday gospel readings.

First a little church calendar refresher. Ordinary Time happens twice. The first begins now and extends through Ash Wednesday (March 2) as Lent begins. Pentecost (June 5) begins the second period of Ordinary Time concluding with the beginning of the Advent Season (Nov. 27). Also, notable we are in Year C for the Catholic church Sunday cycle. This actually began on the first Sunday of Advent (Nov. 28) and extends to Nov. 20, of this year. During Ordinary Time our priests wear green vestments to symbolize hope and life. Our Gospel readings at Mass each Sunday will mostly center around the Gospel of Mark and chapter six of John.

Mark takes us through the life of Christ. His gospel is not flowery, but short and to the point. We need to let that simplicity bring about prayerful time for reflection. Throughout these readings we will hear the words of Jesus, the decisions of his first disciples to leave their homes, jobs, and families in order to follow Christ. His ministry unfolds for us on his journey as he travels from town to town, teaches, cures illnesses, and forgives believers of their sins. We can put ourselves in these readings as the ones being spoken to, a follower, or a simple bystander witnessing miracles before our eyes.

However, Scripture is not always easy to understand and can be cumbersome. That is exactly when we need to reflect and pray, asking God to give us the grace to understand what He is saying to us. Consider it a challenge. St. Jerome was devoted to the Bible to read it, break it down, meditate on it, speak it with a joyful heart, and act on it, mirroring

We can learn a lot from the saints and what made them exemplary. During these four weeks honor our saints by reading more about them or watch a movie or documentary depicting their lives. Here are a few: The Song of Bernadette, about St. Bernadette Soubirous and released in 1943; A Man for All Seasons, about St. Thomas More and released in 1966; Therese, about St. Therese the Little Flower and released in 1986; and Fatima (the latest movie was released in 2020; the classic movie was from 1952), about Ss. Francisco and Jacinta Marto, and their cousin Sr. Lucia de Jesus.

Read your FaithInWV e-bulletin. Our issues include features stories about the saints. A few to look forward to are St. Francis de Sales (feast day Jan. 24); St. Thomas Aquinas (feast day Jan. 28); St. John Bosco (feast day Jan. 31); and St. Brigid of Ireland (feast day Feb. 1). Share these stories with your friend group, children in your lives, and anyone you are moved to evangelize.

Raising Awareness about Poverty

January is Poverty Awareness Month, a month-long initiative to raise awareness and call attention to the growth of poverty in our country.

Across the state, Catholic Charities West Virginia staff and volunteers meet people and families daily who are impacted by poverty. Since poverty looks different from one person to another, it can be challenging to recognize.

Take the "Smith" family, for example. Both parents have jobs and a stable income. And yet, they and their two children had been living with extended family because they could not afford a home of their own. They were experiencing homelessness.

Consider the actual startup cost of finding a place to rent. You need to save up a security deposit and at least your first month of rent. You also need furniture — a bed for your children and a table for your family's meals; cleaning supplies to help keep your family healthy; dishes, bedding, and towels.

Understandably, the Smiths had trouble saving enough to get started in their own place.

Many families are faced with similar struggles. The minimum wage in West Virginia (\$8.75/hour) means that two earners, like the Smiths, can make \$36,400 if both are working full time. Rent for a 2-bedroom apartment takes about one-third of that gross income. Once you factor in taxes, childcare, clothing, and food, there's not much left.

The Smiths came to us during a vulnerable time. They asked for help and we met this family with dignity and compassion. In addition to helping them with their security deposit, we invited other members of the community to help out as well. The response was overwhelming and the family received a table, chairs, twin bed, full bed, sofa, dresser, bath towels, dishes, and bedding.

Living in poverty can lead to feelings of despair and hopelessness. Pope Francis, in his message for World Day of the Poor, said, "Let us ask ourselves: what is demanded of us as Christians in the face of this reality? We are required to nurture tomorrow's hope by healing today's pain." We are grateful and humbled by this call to serve!

First Reading Isaiah 62:1-5

For Zion's sake I will not be silent, for Jerusalem's sake I will not be quiet, until her vindication shines forth like the dawn and her victory like a burning torch.

When the wine ran short, the mother of Jesus said to him, "They have no wine." And Jesus said to her, "Woman, how does your concern affect me? My hour has not yet come." His mother said to the servers, "Do whatever he tells you." Now there were six stone water jars there for Jewish ceremonial washings, each holding twenty to thirty gallons. Jesus told them, "Fill the jars with water." So they filled them to the brim. Then he told them, "Draw some out now and take it to the headwaiter." So they took it. And when the headwaiter tasted the water that had become wine, without knowing where it came from — although the servers who had drawn the water knew -, the headwaiter called the bridegroom and said to him, "Everyone serves good wine first, and then when people have drunk freely, an inferior one; but you have kept the good wine until now." Jesus did this as the beginning of his signs at Cana in Galilee and so revealed his glory, and his disciples began to believe in him.


That, inspired by the model of Doctor Martin Luther King, Jr., all the citizens of this nation may work to fight injustice anywhere, let us pray to the Lord. . .


