


Be Blessed and a Blessing



In today's Gospel, Matthew shares the Beatitudes - the mindset and roadmap we need on our journey through life. It is truly Christ's teachings of how to live - blessed and a blessing.

This was part of the Sermon on the Mount given by Jesus. It was one of the first things Christ did in his early ministry. For more than 2,000 years pilgrims have traveled to Capernaum, the hometown of the first disciples (Peter and Andrew), to trek up the mountain, where Christ preached. It is referred to now as the Mount of Beatitudes and it overlooks the Sea of Galilee.

Today, pull out your bibles and reread what we hear in the Mass (Mathew 5:1-12a). Read as if Jesus is speaking right to you about how He wants us to think and live. He is telling us we should not regard power and prestige as blessings, but instead consider being humble, pure, and merciful as gifts to be embraced.

Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

Blessed are they who mourn, for they will be comforted.

Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the land.

Blessed are they who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be satisfied.

Blessed are the merciful, for they will be shown mercy.

Blessed are the clean in heart, for they will see God.

Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God.

Blessed are they who are persecuted for the sake of righteousness, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

Blessed are you when they insult and hate you and utter every kind of evil against you falsely because of me. Rejoice and be glad, for your reward will be great in heaven.

CATHOLIC SCHOOLS WEEK FOCUS: Mapping For The Future

MAP ASSESSMENTS GIVE STUDENTS IN WV CATHOLIC SCHOOLS CLEAR ROADMAP

As Catholic Schools Week begins we continue we highlight for you a few ways our 24 Catholic schools in the diocese are mapping for continued success for students and buildings.

Backed by assessments that are given three times a year, the Catholic Schools of West Virginia provide educators, families, and students the opportunity to identify any learning gaps, as well as identify areas where the student can be challenged at a higher level.

The diocesan schools partner with the Northwest Evaluation Association (NWEA) for their state-aligned, online Measure of Academic Progress (MAP) assessments.

"Our MAP assessments truly serve as a roadmap for us for grade level aptitude, and college and career readiness," Associate Superintendent Jennifer Hornyak said.

"The NWEA tests are adaptive, meaning students are measured where they are across grade levels instead of just at their grade level," she said and added, "The online test adjusts during the assessment based on the student's right or wrong answers. A right answer challenges the student to a harder question. A wrong answer bumps down a level to identify where the student's ability is in the subject area, resulting in an identification marker of what the child's needs may be to grow in this subject area. The teacher than can adapt their lesson plan to help the student attain individual goals, grade level goals, and cross grade level goals."

The MAP testing also identifies college and career readiness.

"That is another asset of the assessment model, providing us a clear look at what opportunities would be best for our students to help them be the best version of themselves after their educational career with us," Hornyak said.

PLANNING FOR THE FUTURE

Hand in hand with student achievement, the Catholic Schools of WV make it a priority to be forward thinking in all areas of operation.

The diocesan Catholic schools follow an Intentional Growth Planning (IGP) model that implements an additional level of accountability and vitality for the Catholic Schools of West Virginia.

Superintendent Mary Ann Deschaine, Ed.S., said the school system must constantly evaluate its operations to not only a key to maintaining a vibrant community of schools, but also a key to the overall success of the students.

"Just as we expect our students to be better than yesterday in every way, we look at ourselves as a whole system to do the same," she said, noting the system's IGP – a four-year roadmap of accountability for stronger Catholic grade and high schools in the state.

"In collaboration with our principals, pastors, parishes, parents, alumni, and diocesan staff we work to continually improve and grow in our Catholic Identity, leadership, academic excellence, enrollment, and operational vitality. Hand in hand with our Cognia accreditation process we continue to evaluate our performance not only in the classroom, but also across the board and then aim higher."



Feast of the Presentation of the Lord ~ Feb. 2

CELEBRATE THE LIGHT OF CHRIST AND THE COURAGE OF MARY AND JOSEPH

The day of Jesus' presentation in the temple was a sign of Mary and Joseph's humility and respect for their Jewish faith; but for as joyous the moment was, it was also a day that pierced Mary's heart.

The moments were described by Luke and shared the Gospel reading for the day (Luke 2:22-40).

As required by Mosaic Law for all males 40 days after they are born, Jesus was presented at the temple. Most parents brought along a lamb and pigeon as a sacrifice for the mother's purification, but Joseph and Mary were so poor they were only able to offer two turtledoves.

It was the first public introduction of Jesus into the house of God.

At the temple the Holy Family was greeted by an elder priest named Simeon and the prophetess Anna was also there. They like others had waited a lifetime for the promised Messiah. Luke's passage declares that Simeon knew immediately the infant Jesus was the Savior he waited ages to see. He took the child into his arms then proudly raised him high and in a voice of praise

exclaimed in thanksgiving to God, "Now, Master, you may let your servant go in peace, according to your word, for my eyes have seen your salvation, which you prepared in sight of all the peoples, a light for revelation to the Gentiles, and glory for your people Israel" (Luke 2:29-32).

This beautiful proclamation from Simeon leads to another special custom in the Church – Candlemas. This is the day our parishes will bless the candles they will use throughout the year, and it is also the day when we can take our own prayer candles to church for a blessing.

Let the flame of your prayer candle bring to mind Simeon's elated declaration of affirmation to Mary and Joseph that Jesus is the light for all people, His salvation, and His love for us. Pray in confidence, knowing His light will guide the life of the faithful to eternal happiness.

At Mass your celebrant has the option of ending the Gospel reading at the conclusion of Simeon's great joy (Luke 2:32) or continue with the entire passage that concludes at verse 40.

What happens next in those verses reveal a striking truth - what we now identify as one of the seven piercing sorrows of Mary.

Simeon blessed the Holy Family, then looked at Mary, and said to her (Luke 2:34-35), "This child is destined for the falling and the rising of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be opposed so that the inner thoughts of many will be revealed—and a sword will pierce your own soul too."



Can you imagine young Mary's heart? She was only in her early teens. One minute she is elated to hear that this great priest and prophetess recognized her baby as the one who will save the world, but in the next Simeon voices the prophecy that this Christ Child will also divide the people He was sent to save.

Being devout Jews, Mary knew exactly what Simeon was saying to her for it is written in Psalm 22, the Messiah's feeling of abandonment and mockery; and Isaiah 53, which the prophet proclaims the lamb led to slaughter and tortured for the sins of the people. As we pray today, recalling this whirlwind of emotions don't diminish our Blessed Mother's emotions - her pounding heart, her labored breath, her racing thoughts....

Furthermore, have confidence in Joseph and Mary as our intercessors for they not only walked this earth like us, but also time and time again showed great obedience to God in all circumstances.

Let us pray that in our faithfulness we live in the light of Christ. God, give us the courage to bring our souls and the souls of others out of the darkness. Just as Mary and Joseph, who loved you and trusted you every step, let us have faith beyond all fears. Your plan is greater than our own for we know one day we will join You in heaven and have eternal joy, love, and peace. Amen.


PRAYER INTENTIONS

MAKING LASTING AND MEANINGFUL CHANGE



Logan Holdren enrolled in adult education classes at Catholic Charities West Virginia to better his circumstances.

At Catholic Charities West Virginia (CCWVa), we provide caring and compassionate services to people in need and work toward lasting and meaningful change. Logan Holdren's story is an example of our services helping a person to make those lasting and meaningful changes in his life.

Logan Holdren dropped out of high school in the 11th grade.

"I didn't like school. I kept missing days and didn't want to do any of my work," said Logan. "Then, my mom got sick, and I didn't want to go any more for sure. So, I quit."

Logan turned to drugs, and quickly, things spiraled out of control.

Logan knew he needed to make changes to his life. His sister told him about the Mullens Opportunity Center (MOC) and the Adult Education classes offered by CCWVa's McDowell Learning Center.

In addition to enrolling in the High School Equivalency class offered by Catholic Charities' Adult Education Instructor Michelle Montz, Logan entered an addiction treatment program with Southern Highlands.

"I was amazed about how easy it was to get back into the flow of learning," Logan said.

When Logan earned his High School Equivalency, he was thrilled. He enrolled in the WV Transition Jobs Program (formerly the WV Empowered Employment Program), which helps people in recovery gain employment and on-the-job training by assisting employers in paying wages.

Logan started his new job in January.

Education is just one of the many vehicles Catholic Charities employs to create lasting and meaningful change in the lives of those we serve.
