The *FaithInWV* e-bulletin has reached a significant milestone! **It's our 200th issue today!**

The Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston's first ever e-bulletin was created in the initial days of a national emergency, when the Church was closed due to the COVID-19 pandemic. It was our way to be connected and grow in faith together virtually.

As Bishop Mark Brennan said in our first issue, "We pledge to you to do our very best to provide you spiritual resources and the assurance of our prayers," and that continues to be our commitment.

Initially about 8,000 Catholics were emailed the e-bulletin. Today it is sent to 14,000 faithful.

The publication was named after the #FaithInWV profile features showcased on our FaithInWV.org website and published in *The Catholic Spirit*. Like its namesake, the e-bulletin content gives hope, helps us focus on our faith, and encourages each of us to lead by the example of great saints and disciples.



THE BAPTISM OF THE LORD

PUT YOURSELF IN THE SCENE ~ THE DAY CHRIST'S MINISTRY BEGAN.



In the Gospel reading for the Baptism of the Lord, celebrated on Monday, January 8, Mark (1:7-11) tells us how John the Baptist declared to the crowd waiting to be baptized in the Jordan River that Jesus of Nazareth is mightier than he, and He would baptize with the Holy Spirit. Then upon baptizing his cousin, Jesus immersed from the water and the heavens opened up and the Holy Spirit descended upon him with a voice of God saying, “You are my beloved, Son; with you I am well pleased.”

Put yourself in the scene as you reflect on this significant day – the day Jesus began his public ministry. It is also the day that the people heard the Almighty speak.

At Baptism we all become children of God. When we are baptized, we are forgiven of original sin and have a new life – we are sons and daughters of God.

While Jesus was born without sin, He welcomed the chance to walk down the muddy banks of the Jordan River to be among the sinners. He wanted to unite with the people and humbly be immersed in the river water to set an example for humanity and to fulfill prophecy.

The moment after we are baptized, the day we are confirmed, and each time we renew our baptismal vows – we strengthen the power of the Holy Spirit within us.

As we touch our fingers to holy water and bless ourselves, be reminded who we are and whose we are. We are children of God Most High, redeemed by Jesus Christ on the Cross, members of God’s family, and forgiven and purified by the Passion, Death, and Resurrection of Christ.

Further, each time you bless yourself think of what the late Minnesota Archbishop Emeritus Harry Flynn would ask his parishioners to picture God the Father looking upon you, seeing the real you – your brokenness, shame, strengths, beauty, joys, sorrows, etc. He is smiling at you, because he knows you and loves you just as you are – a follower of Christ, a reflection of his love, mercy, and pride.

EPIPHANY SUNDAY ~ WHAT ARE YOUR GIFTS TO CHRIST?

Epiphany Sunday –a great day to consider what gifts you can give Jesus this year.



The Solemnity of the Epiphany of the Lord is the day our parishes add the wisemen to the manger scene with their gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. There is prophetic meaning behind the gifts. Gold is a gift for a king. Frankincense is a gift for a priest.

Myrrh is a fragrant burial ointment, more prized than gold in Christ’s time. The gifts acknowledge the great prophecies – Jesus’ Incarnation as King of kings, a priest for all, and a redeemer who will endure pain and death to give us all forgiveness and eternal life.

While contemplating what gifts we can present to our Emmanuel, consider being like the wisemen – life-long learners, humble, and aware of signs from Heaven.

As Catholics we know we can find the Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist and can spend time with God at Adoration or praying before the tabernacle. When not with Him in Church, be with him in Scripture, prayer, and in faith formation opportunities. In these moments it can become clearer what to give our Savior.

Reading Scripture, we learn what Jesus wants from us, including:

The gift of our hearts - Love God, and love our neighbor (Matthew 22:36-40)

The gift of humility – Pledge the gift to be humble. Not only admit to sins Just as we seek forgiveness for our sins, but we must also forgive the sins of others (Matthew 6:14)

The gift of gratitude – In all things and in all circumstances give thanks to God. (1 Thessalonians 5:18)

The gift of our presence and letting others see Christ in us – We need to be the light of the world, so others see Christ in us, our deeds, and our praise to God) Matthew 5:16.

Let Epiphany Sunday be a revelation to us all. Let us realize that the greatest present of all is our presence, where we can surely find His presence.
