



GOD BLESS AMERICA ~ LET SONG BE HEARTFELT PRAYER

Many of us who attended Catholic school or participated in our original wording before releasing it as follows: parish choirs often heard from our parents and teachers, "Singing songs at church are like praying twice."

Whether singing during Mass or outside of Mass these songs written to lift our spirits, share our joy, remind us of humility, and praise the Lord can and should be read as sincere prayers.

This is true of the song God Bless America. While not a traditional Catholic hymn it is often sung in our parishes before or after Mass in honor of Independence Day.



The song was written in 1918 by a young Jewish immigrant, Irving Berlin. When he wrote it, he was serving in the US Army. He was quoted as saying "It is not a patriotic song, but an expression of gratitude for what this country has done for its citizens."

Berlin came to America with

his parents and siblings at the age of five after an anti-Jewish group attacked his home in Russia. The family made New York's Lower East Side their home. He was born Israel Baline in 1888 but changed his name legally in 1911 to Irving Berlin.

The song wasn't released until 1938, when tensions in Europe began because of Adolf Hitler. He did make a few edits to his

OUR WORLD NEEDS THE LESSON OF ST. MARIA GORETTI

What the world needs now can be found in the story of St. Maria Goretti.

The young saint who died in 1902 at age 11 is the epidemy of mercy and forgiveness.

"In today's society, in which forgiveness is so rare, mercy is ever more important," Pope Francis said.

We all know it is so hard

to forgive and not hold a grudge against someone who hurt us or someone or something we love. Sensationalism in our society makes it so easy to be spiteful, scrutinize, point the finger, and blame others. So many use social media to spread negativity and ugliness yet call themselves Christian. Pretty sure Christ would not click "Like".

As true followers of Jesus, Christians "must let go of resentments and forgive those who have wronged them so that they may experience God's forgiveness," Pope Francis said.

As we celebrate St. Maria Goretti's feast day on July 6th let us be ever mindful of her example.

St. Maria Goretti was born in 1890, one of six children from a very poor Catholic farming family in Italy. As the family moved about to find work, they ended up in a small town about 40 miles outside of Rome so her father, Luigi Goretti, could work as a sharecropper. A year later, he died of malaria as a result of the mosquito infestation in the





mother, Assunta Goretti, had no choice but to take on her husband's work in the fields, leaving young St. Maria to care for her younger siblings and do all of the household chores. The family shared a home, part of an old warehouse, with another poor family Giovanni Serenelli, a widower, and his son

Alessandro. St. Maria would do household work for the Serenellis as well.

It is important to note that St. Maria never complained of her responsibilities. Some historians note that she actually was encouraging to her mother reassuring her that as long as they had faith in God, Jesus would take care of them.

When her mother was out working in the fields Alessandro Serenelli had tried to force himself on young St. Maria, but she was able to fight him off. He had threatened her if she ever told. The young man of about 20 continued to sexually harass her until July 5, 1902, when she was all alone in the kitchen, he attacked her. It is recorded that she again fought him protesting that, "This is a sin! God does not want it," and told Alesandro he "would go to hell!"

This time she could not fight him off, he stabbed her a total of 14 times. Her body so petite the sharp object went clear through her each time.

St. Maria was found by Giovanni Serenelli and Assunta Goretti, miraculously still alive in a pool of her own blood. They rushed her to the hospital, she told her mother and police that it was Alessandro who committed this heinous crime.

At the hospital, she offered her pain up to Jesus. In her last words before she died on July 6, 1902, she said, "I forgive Alessandro

> The story doesn't end there. God's plan had many more lessons for us.

> Six years after the attack, St. Maria appeared to Alessandro in a dream. He said she presented him with 14 white lilies representing forgiveness - one for each time he stabbed her.

> This was the beginning of the young man's miraculous conversion. According to records, he called for a bishop and confessed his crime. When he was released from

> > prison, he traveled right to the home of Assunta Goretti to publicly ask for forgiveness. She like her daughter did. It was Christmas Eve. The two actually attended Mass together.

> > Afterwards Alessandro Serenelli joined a Franciscan monastery and served there as a lay brother.



In 1935, when the cause for St. Maria's canonization was opened, it was Alessandro, who testified of her miraculous intercession and sanctity.

She was canonized in 1950 with her mother and her murderer in attendance. In his homily Pope Pius XII declared Maria Goretti, "the sweet little martyr of purity."



There is so much more to this story to inspire us all to be more merciful, forgiving, and stronger in our faith. Let us stay focused on earning Christ's forgiveness, so we too may be with St. Maria Goretti in heaven.


