The Solemnity of The Most Holy Body and Blood of L Christ - the feast of Corpus Christi - celebrates the tradition and belief in the body and blood of Jesus Christ and His true presence in the Eucharist.

As we receive Communion at Mass, we are honoring and celebrating Christ in the Eucharist and our lives. The Church teaches us the Eucharist is "the source and summit of the Christian life."

"Everything in our life leads up to it and all our power to live in newness of life and to love as Jesus loved flows from it," Bishop Mark Brennan said in a May letter to the Faithful of WV. "The Eucharist is nothing less than Jesus Christ in person. In a mysterious way that we can describe but not truly explain, he changes bread and wine in their deepest reality into his Body and Blood, so that he can build us up from within. A genuine belief in

He has encouraged our pastors to host public processions in which the Eucharist is carried through the street, "letting us Catholics show our friends and neighbors, whether Catholic or not, that we joyfully proclaim our faith in the Eucharistic Lord."

St. John gives us the Bread of Life Discourse in John 6:22-71. This reading is "an excellent opportunity to deepen our understanding of the Eucharist," Bishop Brennan said. "John takes us from seeing Jesus feed thousands with ordinary bread as a sign of his messiahship, to hearing the call to put our faith in Jesus as the new manna

CREATING A MORE ACCESSIBLE SPACE

Imagine you have an in-person job interview and need clean clothes to wear, but you cannot afford to go to the laundromat. Perhaps you have four school-age children and your water has been shut off. Maybe you are experiencing homelessness and do not have a place to take a shower.

For many of our neighbors, these are real situations. Fortunately, our staff in the Martinsburg office has been able to address them by offering free shower and laundry services. Unfortunately, the washer and dryer unit, as well as the shower, have been on the second floor, which is accessible only by a narrow stairway. Additionally, the shower stall did not accommodate people with physical disabilities.

In the fall of 2020, Catholic Charities West Virginia received a \$29,835 Women Investing in Shepherd (WISH) grant from the Shepherd University Foundation to modify the bathroom facilities on the first floor to add a handicap accessible shower and to accommodate the washer and dryer unit. Remaining grant funds will be used to purchase laundry detergent, soap, and shampoo, and to pay monthly water bills.

Many individuals seeking assistance from Catholic Charities and other social service agencies have mobility issues, with many using wheelchairs, walkers and canes. Additionally, some individuals are arthritic or have oxygen tanks. By moving these services to the first floor and ensuring the facilities are accessible to people with disabilities, services will be available to more people.

THE SOLEMNITY OF THE MOST HOLY BODY AND BLOOD OF CHRIST

First Reading EXODUS 24:3-8

When Moses came to the people and related all the words and ordinances of the LORD, they all answered with one voice, "We will do everything that the LORD has told us." Moses then wrote down all the words of the LORD and, rising early the next day, he erected at the foot of the mountain an altar and twelve pillars for the twelve tribes of Israel. Then, having sent certain young men of the Israelites to offer holocausts and sacrifice young bulls as peace offerings to the LORD, Moses took half of the blood and put it in large bowls; the other half he splashed on the altar. Taking the book of the covenant, he read it aloud to the people, who answered, "All that the LORD has said, we will heed and do." Then he took the blood and sprinkled it on the people, saying, "This is the blood of the covenant that the LORD has made with you in accordance with all these words of his."

Second Reading HEBREWS 9:11-15

Brothers and sisters: When Christ came as high priest of the good things that have come to be, passing through the greater and more perfect tabernacle not made by hands, that is, not belonging to this creation, he entered once for all into the sanctuary, not with the blood of goats and calves but with his own blood, thus obtaining eternal redemption. For if the blood of goats and bulls and the sprinkling of a heifer's ashes can sanctify those who are defiled so that their flesh is cleansed, how much more will the blood of Christ, who through the eternal Spirit offered himself unblemished to God, cleanse our consciences from dead works to worship the living God. For this reason he is mediator of a new covenant: since a death has taken place for deliverance from transgressions under the first covenant, those who are called may receive the promised eternal inheritance.

Gospel MARK 14:12-16, 22-26

On the first day of the Feast of Unleavened Bread, when they sacrificed the Passover lamb, Jesus' disciples said to him, "Where do you want us to go and prepare for you to eat the Passover?" He sent two of his disciples and said to them, "Go into the city and a man will meet you, carrying a jar of water. Follow him.
