# BLESSED IN THE MOUNTAIN STATE DIACONATE ORDINATION

After years of discernment, formation, and prayer 20 men will now receive the title of deacons as of their June 7th ordination at the Basilica of the Co-Cathedral of the Sacred Heart in Charleston.

This is a great blessing for the Mountain state and the first permanent deacon class ordained for the diocese since 2016.

From this weekend forward they will assist the bishop and his priests in the celebration of the divine ministries, distribute holy Communion, assist, and bless marriages, proclaim the Gospel and preach the good news, preside at funerals and, most especially, dedicate themselves to the ministry of charity. They can be they can be married, have families and secular jobs, in addition to being ordained to the clergy.

THE MEMORIAL OF St. BARNABAS THE APOSTLE - JUNE 11. Saint Barnabas can fittingly be described as the forgotten one, because we only know a few details of his life.


However, because he is mentioned repeatedly with Saint Paul does signify his importance and gives us a reference point of what his character may have been like.


As an apostle we know he was a leader sent out by Christ and the Holy Spirit to evangelize the world. His original name was Joseph (Acts 4:36), but he became known as Barnabas, which means "son of encouragement" – which illuminates his personality.

Learn about this "Good man, filled with the Holy Spirit and faith" by reading Acts 4:36-37; 11:24-26; and 15:36-40.

June 13 is the Feast Day of St. Anthony of Padua. Catholic children learn at a young age to call out to him in a sing-song prayer "Tony! Tony! Look around. Something's lost but must be found," reciting it over and over. As adults, many of our prayers to St. Anthony are more desperate, calling upon him to go to Christ with our needs.

Born Fernando Bulhom in 1195 in Portugal, he entered the St. Augustine Monastery at the age of 15 for a "proper formation" of faith and mastered theology as an Augustinian for the 11 years he was with the order. One day he witnessed the bodies of five Franciscans who had been beheaded and martyred in Morocco being carried back to Portugal. That horrific sight motivated Fernando to defend the faith and not just be a scholar of it. He realized his longing – his hunger – was to bring souls to God. He left the order and became a Franciscan, and his name became Anthony.





He is quoted as saying, "The creator of the heavens obeys a carpenter; the God of eternal glory listens to a poor virgin. Has anyone ever witnessed anything comparable to this? Let the philosopher no longer disdain from listening to the common laborer; the wise, to the simple; the educated, to the illiterate; a child of a prince, to a peasant."

He proved himself genuine, willing to live the gospel not just preach about it.



Saint Germaine Cousin's life had the outline of a fairytale - evil step mother, cruel treatment, and yet - a beautiful disposition. She was born with a deformed right hand and neck; her dear mother died when Germaine was only five; and her devoted father died soon after he had remarried a woman that detested the sight and thought of her. Her living quarters was in the family barn.

She was a shepherdess tending to sheep in the field every day, trusting God so much she would leave the flock and walk to daily Mass, knowing the sheep would not stray in God's care. It was even witnessed that the flooded river in her village parted for St. Germaine to cross so she wouldn't be late for Mass. Because of this and many more miraculous events the townspeople looked upon her as extraordinary in God's sight, which only angered her stepmother even more.

It's recorded that one day when she went off to town to share her bread for the day with the poor her stepmother had followed her. Once she got to the town square, the nasty woman accused the child of stealing food and made her in front of all around open her apron to reveal the bread. However, when she did it wasn't bread that was inside the apron it was beautiful flowers that would not have been in bloom at that time of year. The child handed her stepmother one of the prettiest blooms saying, "Please accept this flower, Mother. God sends it to you in sign of His forgiveness."


Saint Germaine died at the age of 22. On the night she died two monks reported seeing the night sky above the barn she slept in light up and angles descending. Forty-three years after her death her body was found incorrupt.


On June 15th, we honor her on her feast day.


