
St. Joseph Our Mighty Patron

St. Joseph is the patron of the universal Church. Pope Francis declared a Year of St. Joseph for the whole Church, which began on Dec. 8, 2020 and will conclude on Dec. 8, 2021. As a diocese with St. Joseph as our patron we extend the Year of St. Joseph, honoring the beloved father, guardian of the holy family, and obedient and humble servant of God, hrough his solemnity in March next year.

The prominent place that Saint Joseph holds in our church tradition can be seen in his patronage, his liturgical feasts, the religious communities that have taken his name, his apparitions with the Blessed Mother, the major shrines and basilicas dedicated to him, the Church documents written about him, the prayers said to him, his place in the liturgy, as well as the studies devoted to him.

"I believe we can all benefit from meditating on St. Joseph's admirable life of faith and love and from seeking his intercession before the Lord on our behalf, said Bishop Mark Brennan.

Like Joseph we need to be present, compassionate, and "ever ready to carry out God's will," Pope Francis said, reminding us that Joseph was an ordinary person just like us.

During this year we are asked to take time reflect on the life of our patron, and to put ourselves in his shoes. God chose him, a poor man, to be the earthly father of Jesus, and husband to the Virgin Mary. He sent an angel to Joseph in a dream to tell him not to divorce Mary, because the child she conceived was of the Holy Spirit. Joseph strong in faith obeyed the command. Before the birth Joseph had to take Mary, who was long into her pregnancy, on a daunting 90-mile trip from Nazareth to Bethlehem for a census declared by the Roman empire. Can we even truly begin to imagine the hardships, the physical toll, the emotional stress, and the overwhelming concern he endured to get Mary there safely?

We all know what happened next, once they finally arrived in Bethlehem – inevitably, it was time for the birth of Christ. Being poor and finding nowhere to stay they took shelter in a stable in a cave among the hills. Our hearts know he surely wanted better accommodations for Mary. However, God's perfect plan was for the Savior of the World to be born in the simplest of places. So, among the animals Jesus was born and placed in a manger. TIME TO RING IN HAPPY ST. PATRICK'S DAY!

We all know Saint Patrick of Ireland is famous for using the shamrock to teach Christianity and the Trinity. We are also familiar with the legend that he banished all snakes from the Emerald Isle. Do you know about the bell?

According to legend, there were many bells. It is believed that as St. Patrick helped set up a church or Christian community before he left, he would give the leader a bell. The idea was the bell would be used to call the community to prayer.

However, one bell in particular known as the Bell of the Will of St. Patrick is showcased at the National Museum of Ireland. Faithful Irish believe it may have belonged to St. Patrick when he was in Armagh. The actual bell is about seven inches high and in the shape of sheep bell. It is made out of iron and coated in bronze. In ancient Ireland these bells were venerated as holy objects and therefore given to a bell keeper, who often buried the bells for

safe keeping. The bell was said to have been buried with St. Patrick but retrieved 60 years after his death. It was presented to Armagh as a precious relic. An ornate cover was made for the bell around 1100 AD (more than 600 years after St. Patrick died) at the order of the King Domhnall Ua Lochlainn(aka Donall O'Loghlin). There have been many keepers of the bell through the centuries, but it was finally bequeathed to the nation. The bell is part of a permanent exhibit in the Treasury Gallery at the National Museum of Ireland in Dublin.

CATHOLIC CHARITIES VOLUNTEERS PROVIDE FREE TAX PREPARATION SERVICES

team began last fall to plan how they could safely provide tax

Preparing and filing tax returns can often be an unwanted chore, but for many West Virginians it can also be difficult and nearly impossible without help.

'Joseph and Mildred' cannot read or write well.

'Ann' speaks limited English.

'George and Margaret' are hard of hearing.

'Jessica' has moved out of her parents' house and is supporting herself by working at a fast food restaurant.

As part of the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program, Catholic Charities certified volunteers prepare tax returns for low- and moderate-income taxpayers free of charge.

The Catholic Charities Martinsburg office has been able to help all of these individuals and hundreds more through its participation in the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program for low- and moderate-income taxpayers. As part of the program, certified volunteers, recruited by Catholic Charities staff, prepare tax returns free of charge.


Last year, Catholic Charities volunteer tax preparers completed returns for 220 taxpayers who received a total of \$334,648 in federal tax returns and \$29,287 in state tax returns for Eastern Panhandle residents. They were able to accomplish this despite the COVID-19 pandemic. With the extension of the filing season, the volunteers continued to help clients into the summer.

In preparation of this year's tax season, the Catholic Charities team began last fall to plan how they could safely provide tax services. Instead of having the volunteers meet with clients and prepare the taxes at the office, staff and volunteers are meeting clients at their cars to collect documents and then scan them to a secure site. The eight volunteer tax preparers access the documents remotely and then contact the tax clients via phone to complete the returns.

Despite the pandemic, Catholic Charities continues to work with community partners to help vulnerable individuals, and the volunteers are going beyond what is required of them. For example, the manager at a local low-income senior housing program is collecting information and documents from residents. Staff and volunteers are picking up and delivering paperwork directly to the complex. Because of this, clients that have cognitive and physical issues are still receiving the personal tax help they need.

While the VITA tax program is provided in addition to the Martinsburg office's year-round services, the extra work is worthwhile because the tax clients are all very appreciative. As one woman said, "I don't know what I would do if Catholic Charities didn't provide this service."

FOURTH SUNDAY OF LENT

First Reading 2 CHRONICLES 36:14-16, 19-23

In those days, all the princes of Judah, the priests, and the people added infidelity to infidelity, practicing all the abominations of the nations and polluting the LORD's temple which he had consecrated in Jerusalem. Early and often did the LORD, the God of their fathers, send his messengers to them, for he had compassion on his people and his dwelling place. But they mocked the messengers of God, despised his warnings, and scoffed at his prophets, until the anger of the LORD against his people was so inflamed that there was no remedy. Their enemies burnt the house of God, tore down the walls of Jerusalem, set all its palaces afire, and destroyed all its precious objects. Those who escaped the sword were carried captive to Babylon, where they became servants of the king of the Chaldeans and his sons until the kingdom of the Persians came to power. All this was to fulfill the word of the LORD spoken by Jeremiah: "Until the land has retrieved its lost sabbaths, during all the time it lies waste it shall have rest while seventy years are fulfilled." In the first year of Cyrus, king of Persia, in order to fulfill the word of the LORD spoken by Jeremiah, the LORD inspired King Cyrus of Persia to issue this proclamation throughout his kingdom, both by word of mouth and in writing: "Thus says Cyrus, king of Persia: All the kingdoms of the earth the LORD, the God of heaven, has given to me, and he has also charged me to build him a house in Jerusalem, which is in Judah. Whoever, therefore, among you belongs to any part of his people, let him go up, and may his God be with him!"

For everyone who does wicked things hates the light and does not come toward the light, so that his works might not be exposed. But whoever lives the truth comes to the light, so that his works may be clearly seen as done in God.
