REJOICE ~ WE ARE HALFWAY THERE

We are halfway through Lent. The Church honors this day as Laetare (pronounced lay-TAR-ray) Sunday. The word Laetare means “rejoice” in Latin.

Indeed, this is a joyous Sunday. Priests will be wearing rose (pink – made of a mix of red and gold) vestments, flowers may appear at the altar, and the liturgical music is allowed to be more upbeat and played more fully.

Laetare Sunday, like its counterpart Gaudete Sunday in Advent, is a mid-point celebration to inspire us; and during Lent it is specifically focused on encouraging us to continue our Lenten commitments of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving.

As a Church we also celebrate the Second Scrutiny for the Elect in RCIA (Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults) today. This is a significant day not only for catechumens but also all the faithful, giving us a day to look within ourselves and seek God’s mercy on all for our sinfulness.

All of the readings this weekend focus on the Light of God – turning away from darkness to seek and be all that is good. Christ is our Light, leading us away from darkness and hard to break habits of selfishness.

Don’t lose trust. Don’t lose hope. God shows up and gives us healing, love, and mercy.

Hang on! Rejoice! You’re halfway there!

CELEBRATE ST. JOSEPH ON MONDAY

The Church will celebrate the Solemnity of St. Joseph on Monday, March 20th this year, because his feast day of March 19 falls on Laetare Sunday.

Saint Joseph the Guardian of the Redeemer is a role model for all Christians for he was a holy man, devout, and completely *human*. He is also the patron of the universal Church.

The prominent place that Saint Joseph holds in our Church Tradition can be seen in his patronage, his liturgical feasts, the religious communities that have taken his name, his apparitions with the Blessed Mother, the major shrines and basilicas dedicated to him, the Church documents written about him, the prayers said to him, his place in the liturgy, as well as the studies devoted to him.

God chose him, a poor man, to be the earthly father of Jesus, and husband to the Virgin Mary. He sent an angel to Joseph in a dream to tell him not to divorce Mary, because the child she conceived was of the Holy Spirit.

Joseph strong in faith obeyed the command. Before the birth Joseph had to take Mary, who was long into her pregnancy, on a daunting 90-mile trip from Nazareth to Bethlehem for a census declared by the Roman empire. Can we even truly begin to imagine the hardships, the physical toll, the emotional stress, and the overwhelming concern he endured to get Mary there safely?

We all know what happened next, once they finally arrived in Bethlehem – inevitably, it was time for the birth of Christ. Being poor and finding nowhere to stay they took shelter in a stable in a cave among the hills. Our hearts know he surely wanted better accommodations for Mary. However, God's perfect plan was for the Savior of the World to be born in the simplest of places. So, among the animals Jesus was born and placed in a manger. Surely Joseph was captivated by the miracle of birth and was in awe of the newborn in his loving arms.

During this month to honor St. Joseph, Fr. Mark Mary, a Franciscan Friar of the Renewal (CFR), who serves through the friary in the Bronx, invites you to contemplate

on the life of St. Joseph as you recite the Joyful Mysteries of the Rosary.

Although there may not be any words attributed to St. Joseph in the Bible, he is an essential part of salvation history, and deserves much more recognition than was granted him.

In order to focus on Joseph - the Terror of Demons consider his mindset, heart, humility, and strength, as it unfolds in the Joyful Mysteries.

Fr. Mark-Mary breaks down each mystery with this in mind:

1. The Annunciation: pray with Luke 1:26-38 and Matthew 1:18-25 (focus on Joseph's response to Mary's pregnancy, and to the angel's message)

2. The Visitation: pray with Luke 1:39-56 (focus on Joseph's response to Mary's Magnificat)

3. The Birth of Christ: pray with Luke 2:1-20 and Matthew 1:25-2:15 (focus on Joseph's response to seeing Christ for the first time)

4. The Presentation: pray with Luke 2:21-40 (focus on Joseph's response to the prophecy of Simeon)

5. Finding Jesus in the Temple: pray with Luke 2:41-52 (focus on Joseph's response to Jesus being lost, and finding him in the temple)

Want to go deeper? Try spending some time in lectio divina with each of these passages. You can split them up over a week, or do one per week, but just spend some time in the shoes of St. Joseph, focusing on his response to the things God was calling him to.

Meditating on the life of St. Joseph will only bring us closer to Christ, helping us see why God chose to entrust such an important role to such a humble carpenter.

Saint Joseph, pray for us.



SUPPORTING RELATIVE CAREGIVERS

In recent years, an increasing number of West Virginians have opened their hearts and homes to parent their grandchildren, nieces or nephews.

When parents are unable to raise their children due to addiction, incarceration, or mental illness, it takes great courage – and resources – to step in.

Catholic Charities West Virginia’s (CCWVa) Relatives as Parents Program (RAPP) is a form of specialized case management providing support to these families. Launched as part of CCWVa’s response to the opioid epidemic, RAPP assists caregivers in addressing their social, emotional, and educational needs.

“Currently, I have a five-year old grandson, a three-year old granddaughter, that I’m raising as well as three foster kids through the state of West Virginia,” said Gail Paige, CCWVa RAPP client.

Paige said she greatly benefited from the RAPP monthly meetings. CCWVa provides child care and an activity for the children while the adult caregivers gather to support one another and learn from various speakers.

“We’d have various topics that we’d talk about... or if there was a topic that we had an interest in, she [Diana Bell, CCWVa Case Management Specialist] would try to bring the resource to us.”

“Sometimes when you lose hope and think that others aren’t watching or caring, they really still are,” said Page. “I feel blessed to be a part of the Catholic Charities RAPP program.”


