SANCTIFIED AND MADE HOLY



Pentecost Sunday – the birthday of the Church. It is a day to open our minds and hearts to the Holy Spirit that descended upon the apostles, Mary, and the followers of Christ gathered in the upper room.

Let us gain wisdom, understanding, counsel, fortitude, and knowledge to do God's will like St. Faustina Kowalska wrote, "Once we open ourselves to the influence of the Holy Spirit, He Himself will fulfill what is lacking in us."

It had been more than a week since the apostles watched Jesus ascend into the clouds to Heaven. On this particular day they were praying with Mary the Blessed Mother. What happened next may have taken them by surprised, even though Jesus had told them an advocate would be sent by God. At the last supper, Jesus said, "the Advocate, the holy Spirit, that the Father will send in my name—he will teach you everything and remind you of all that I told you. So, Peace I leave with you; my peace I give you. Not as the world gives, do I give it to you. Do not let your hearts be troubled or afraid." – John 14:26-27

The Holy Spirit came down like a dove where they were and with a driving wind "tongues as of fire" (Acts 2:3) descended on them. Once timid disciples were now enthusiastic apostles able to speak Christ's word. It was this moment when they completely understood the Passion of our Lord, and that it took the death of Christ and the resurrection in order for all people who believe to join Him in Heaven.

More amazing, the men began speaking languages they previously didn't know. On that very day devout Jews from every nation were in Jerusalem for the Jewish feast of Pentecost, which for them was celebrated at that time as a harvest feast as well as a commemoration of Moses' having received the Jewish law on Mount Sinai.

The apostles went out immediately evangelizing. About 3000 people were baptized that day after hearing St. Peter's passionate message calling for repentance and conversion (Acts 2:14-41).

MARY, MOTHER OF THE CHURCH

Monday after Pentecost - the day the Church began - is the Memorial of the Blessed Virgin Mary, Mother the Church. Pope Francis instituted this feast 2018 acknowledging, "This celebration will help us to remember that growth in the Christian life must be anchored to the Mystery of the Cross, to the oblation of Christ in the Eucharistic Banquet, and to the Mother of the Redeemer, the Virgin who makes her offering to God."

In his formal decree, Pope Francis wrote Mary "standing



beneath the cross (cf. Jn 19:25), accepted her Son's testament of love and welcomed all people in the person of the beloved disciple as sons and daughters to be reborn unto life eternal. She thus became the tender Mother of the Church which Christ begot on the cross handing on the Spirit. Christ, in turn, in the beloved disciple, chose all disciples as ministers of his love towards his Mother, entrusting her to them so that they might welcome her with filial affection."

We don't worship Mary as some non-Catholics believe, we honor her and her role as the Mother of God. We pray for her intercession through the Hail Mary, the rosary, novenas, and litanies among others. The Church considers her the greatest teacher, and perfect example of true and loving discipleship. As she offered Jesus and the disciples her prayers and motherly love, she offers us the same through her intercessions.

Just as the apostles chose to gather and pray with her on Pentecost, the day the Holy Spirit descended upon them, let us pray with her, asking her to intercede for us in our times of need.

Mary, Mother of the Church, pray for us.

PRIESTHOOD, DIACONATE ORDINATIONS SET FOR THIS SPRING

WEST VIRGINIA—In the coming weeks, the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston will be blessed with two ordinations to Holy Orders. Deacon John Soplinski will be ordained to the priesthood on May 31 at 5 p.m. at the Cathedral of St. Joseph in Wheeling. A week later, 20 men will be ordained permanent deacons on June 7 at 3 p.m. at the Basilica of the Co-Cathedral of the Sacred Heart in Charleston.

This will be the first presbyteral ordination for the diocese in three years and one that the vocations director has been anticipating.



"I am so excited for Deacon John Soplinski to become Father John Soplinski. I've known John since his first year in seminary and have seen him grow into the servant and spiritual leader that he is today," said Father Brian Crenwelge, who is also pastor of St. John University Parish in Morgantown and director of Campus Ministry for West Virginia University in Morgantown. "He is a man of sincere faith. He will be able to be a generous instrument of God's mercy to those to whom he ministers. I cannot wait for him to share with me in the ministerial priesthood of Jesus Christ. As the famous Dominican, Jean-Baptiste Lacordaire, once wrote concerning the priesthood, 'My God, what a life; and it is yours, O Priest of Jesus Christ!"

Deacon Soplinski said he is excited to begin his priesthood and to serve the faithful of the diocese who have supported him through his vocational journey.

"They have been so generous the past six years; their prayers helped in a large measure for this day to be possible," he said. What does he hope for in priesthood? "To follow the example of Bishop Brennan and the many priests that have mentored me—to serve God and His people without counting the cost," he said.

Soplinski's home parish is Sacred Heart of Mary in Weirton. He attended Sacred Heart of Mary Grade School and Madonna High School in Weirton, as well as St. Vincent College in Latrobe, Pa., where he received a Bachelor of Science in public policy analysis. He is the son of Gary E. Soplinski and the late Mary Patricia Soplinski. His stepmother is Susan Soplinski. He previously worked for the West Virginia Department of Health and Human Resources from 1997-2001, and then Pittsburgh Public Schools from 2001-2017. He has attended Mount St. Mary's Seminary in Emmitsburg, Md., since 2018.

His first assignment in priesthood will be announced following his ordination.

Permanent Deacons

The ordination of the 20 men to the diaconate next month will be the first permanent deacons ordained for the diocese since 2016. Deacons are ordained to ministry and service where they assist the bishop and his priests in the celebration of the divine ministries, distribute holy Communion, assist, and bless marriages, proclaim the Gospel and preach the good news, preside at funerals and, most especially, dedicate themselves to the ministry of charity.

There are two types of deacons in the Catholic Church: the transitional deacon, who will go on to ordination to priesthood; and the permanent deacon, who is ordained for perpetual ministry in the diaconate.

The 20 candidates to be ordained as permanent deacons in West Virginia next month come from all corners of the state. Three of candidates are from the Martinsburg Vicariate: Bryce Timberlake is a member of St. James the Greater Parish in Charles Town; Patrick Michel is a member of St. Joseph Parish in Martinsburg; and David Torlone is a member of St. Leo Parish in Inwood.

Blessed Sacrament Parish in South Charleston has two candidates: Tony O'Leary and Tommy Ross. Additional candidates from the south are Rick Allen of St. Francis de Sales Parish in Beckley, EJ Brucal of Sacred Heart Parish in Williamson, Michael Kawash of the Basilica of the Co-Cathedral of the Sacred Heart in Charleston, and Ronald Piaskowski of Our Lady of Fatima Parish in Huntington.

Candidates from central West Virginia are Michael Brumley of St. Patrick Parish in Weston, John Butler of St. Matthew Parish in Ravenswood, Victor Cwynar of St. Francis Xavier Parish in Parkersburg, James McCullough of Our Lady of Perpetual Help Parish in Stonewood, and Aaron Talbott of St. Brendan Parish in Elkins.

Candidates from the Northern Panhandle are Dr. John Basil of St. Joseph the Worker Parish in Weirton, William Klug of St. Vincent de Paul Parish in New Martinsville, Robert Krall of St. Michael Parish in Wheeling, Jacob Manning of the Cathedral of St. Joseph in Wheeling, Thomas McFadden of St. Vincent de Paul Parish in Wheeling, and Jason Miller of St. Paul Parish in Weirton.

"I wouldn't trade the last four years of formation for the world," said candidate Michael Kawash. "If I was told that I wouldn't be ordained at this point, I wouldn't have a single regret over spending the last four years in formation—everything I've learned, the friends I've made, the growth in spirituality, all of it has made for a most valuable life experience."

"I am looking forward to serving God's people as a deacon," he continued. "I have learned as part of our formation that the diaconate is actually the model of the Church, which is to serve. So, I am very much looking forward to ministering to the faithful in this way and modeling the service of Christ to all whom I encounter."

Deacon John Yaquinta, coordinator of the diocese's Permanent Diaconate Formation Program, said that when he was ordained in 2016, he never imagined that God would one day call him to be a companion to the 20 men on their journey to ordination.

"Each one of these men has been called to lay down his life in humble service, and that is exactly what they will do as they lay prostrate on the floor of the Co-Cathedral on June 7," said Deacon Yaquinta, who is also permanent deacon at Our Lady of Perpetual Help Parish in Stonewood. "They have let go of hobbies, interests, and even relationships in order to have more time for study, prayer, and formation. They have stepped out of their comfort zones and embraced new forms of service in their parishes. I am very grateful to Bishop Mark Brennan and Father Dennis Schuelkens for entrusting me with their formation. And I look forward to many years of service with each one of them in the College of Permanent Deacons in this Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston."

Their formation was through St. Meinrad School of Theology in Indiana.

Once ordained, the diocese's new deacons will receive their assignments.


Along highways, rural roads, and across rivers of this great land, the Eucharistic Lord will be processed for all to see.

National Eucharistic Congress's Tim Glemkowski shared in a letter to Catholics across the US who are participating in or following the national pilgrimage – our historic moment for our Eucharistic Processions across the country.

Together, they'll process from the margins of America towards Indianapolis for the 10th National Eucharistic Congress.

"We're going to make history as we walk with the Author of history Himself in the Most Blessed Sacrament throughout the cities, valleys, and plains of the United States," Glemkowski said. "Just imagine the Eucharistic experiences that will be recounted by thousands of people for months—even years—after the Pilgrimage!"

The routes begin from Lake Itasca, MN, from the north; New Haven, CT, from the east; Brownsville, TX, from the South; and San Francisco, from the West. The procession across America will end in Indianapolis for the 10th National Eucharistic Congress, July 17-21.



"In addition to those who join the pilgrimage or witness it in wonder as it passes by, consider the millions who will see videos, news segments, and articles about this unique and beautiful journey to transform our nation in Christ," Glemkowski's letter continued.

Eucharistic processions began eight centuries ago, honoring when Jesus gave us the gift of the Eucharist at the Last Supper, "A



new way to walk with him—by making us part of his mystical body," Glemkoski said. "And for nearly 800 years, Corpus Christi processions have brought Jesus through the streets so that others may encounter him personally, just as the Apostles did two millennia ago.

"Imagine the wonder of a child who sees a hundred faithful processing with the monstrance through her small, Bible-belt town.

"Imagine pictures of the Pilgrimage in hundreds of local newspapers and in stories on local TV stations... not to mention the national secular press. What are these Catholics doing?

"Imagine joyful and confident pilgrims, priests, and witnesses being there to answer: This truly is the Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity of Our Lord—the same truth that inspired the greatest saints of history to give up everything and follow him," he wrote.
