

NOVENDIALES' FINAL DAY FOR POPE FRANCIS

Sunday, May 4, 2025, is the final day of the Novendiales (the nine days of mourning and Masses) for the repose of the soul of Pope Francis as is customary since ancient Christian and Roman time.

Catholics and non-Catholics will surely continue to pray for the late pontiff as he will be remembered for being a shepherd of hope for the last 12 years – "a pope who reached out to people who are often overlooked and even despised," Bishop Mark Brennan said upon learning of his passing.

We can honor Pope Francis by embracing the qualities we loved in him. Be a servant leader. Embrace humility. Be empathetic. Don't complicate things. Appreciate and acknowledge others. Be dedicated to prayer, Christ in the Eucharist, and being merciful.

"I think this is truly the most wonderful experience we can have: to belong to a people walking, journeying through history together with our Lord, who walks among us! We are not alone; we do not walk alone. We are part of the one flock of Christ that walks together."

Listen to God:


"If we are to know the Lord, we must go to him. Listen to him in silence before the tabernacle and approach him in the sacraments."

Choose appreciation:

"For all the obstacles we see before us, gratitude and appreciation should prevail over concerns and complaints."

Be strong and live the Gospel:

"Some may try to make you think that your faithfulness to the Gospel and its values is a mistake, because it keeps you from conforming to the crowd and blending in. Do not be afraid of their 'condemnations'! Have no worries; sooner or later, their criticism will fall through, their condemnations will prove false, and their superficial values will be revealed for what they are: illusions...."



Steps to know about the conclave:

- 1. Begins with Mass at St. Peter's calling upon the Holy Spirit at 10am in Rome (4 am EST).
- 2. Cardinals enter the conclave. at the Sistine Chapel & the doors are locked for secrecy.
- 3. Cardinals discuss and consider candidates and what the Church needs now.
- 4. Voting begins and continues 4 times a day until twothirds of the vote is for the chosen.
- 5. Watch the smoke from the chimney if black smoke = no pope, but white smoke = new pope!

There are 133 Cardinal electors in the College of Cardinals that are expected to participate in the conclave and have the right to vote for the new pope. Those over the age of 80 are non-voters.

According to Catholic News Service there are 17 cardinals in the US AND 10 of those are under the age of 80 and eligible to vote for a new pope as part of the Conclave that begins on May 7th.

Cardinal Robert W. McElroy, archbishop of Washington.

Cardinal Robert F. Prevost, prefect of the Dicastery for Bishops under Pope Francis.

Cardinal Joseph W. Tobin of Newark, N.J.

MARY, MYSTICAL ROSE



Have you heard of the devotion to Mary, Mystical Rose?

On Monday of Holy Week, Cardinal Victor Manuel Fernández. the prefect of the Dicastery for the Doctrine of the Faith, blessed a statue of Mystical "Mary, Rose" at the Vatican. The statue, donated by Pope Francis, was placed in a shrine close to the Sacrament Fountain in the Vatican Gardens.

The Dicastery for the Doctrine of the Faith declared last summer that after thorough consideration the devotion to Our Lady under the title Mary, Mystical Rose is officially approved.

According to Vatican News, last July, the Dicastery's decision was based "on the new norms regarding alleged supernatural phenomena, granting the 'nulla osta' authorizing public devotion to Mary under the title 'Mystical Rose,' in connection with messages purportedly received between 1947 and 1966 by visionary Pierina Gilli."




This will allow churches and sacred places to be dedicated/named under this title to Mary.

"The alleged apparitions of Mary under the titles of "Mystical Rose" and "Mother of the Church" are connected to the locality of Fontanelle, located south of the town of Montichiari in the Italian province of Brescia.

"The visionary, Pierina Gilli, was born into a peasant family, and worked as a housekeeper and nurse in a hospital, leading a very simple life until her death in 1991 at the age of 80.

Her mystical experiences occurred over two different periods, the first dating back to 1947, when Our Lady is said to have appeared to Pierina, presenting herself under the titles 'Mystical Rose' and 'Mother of the Church.' On Mary's white robe, Gilli says she saw three roses: one white, one red and one yellow, symbolizing prayer, penance and suffering."



The Marian title 'Mystical Rose' can also be found in the Litany of Loreto, which dates back to 1587, to be said at the Shrine of the Holy House of Loreto.

Pray for The Strength of Young St. Nunzio



He died at the age of 19 from complications from years of neglect, abuse, and a work-related injury as a blacksmith apprentice. Today, let the courage and focus of Saint Nunzio Sulprizio inspire us to complain less, work harder, and remain faithful to God and the Church despite our circumstances. It is his feast day!

Saint Nunzio was an Italian born saint who died on May 5, 1836,

He is an example of remaining grateful to God even when faced with terrible suffering.

To say he had a hard life is an understatement.

He was three when his father died.

Soon after, his baby sister tragically died.

His mother remarried.

His stepfather treated him poorly.

When he was six, his mother died.

He was sent to live with his maternal grandmother. Gratefully, like his mother, she radiated the love of God and was strict with their religious practices. However, he lived with her for only three years until she died. It was after his ninth birthday. Once again, he was alone and broken hearted.

Young Nunzio had to go live with his only family - a stone hearted uncle who refused to let him go to school and forced him to work in his blacksmith shop.

He would beat him if he made a mistake. While working he suffered a severe leg injury, which caused him immense pain and resulted in gangrene. He was hospitalized for months, but nowhere will you read that he gave in to complaining or feeling sorry for himself. He would pray before the tabernacle "to keep Jesus company."

Nunzio accepted his sufferings saying, "Jesus suffered so much for us and by his merits we await eternal life. If we suffer a little bit, we will taste the joy of paradise. Jesus suffered a lot for me. Why should I not suffer for Him? I would die in order to convert even one sinner."

Saint Nunzio lost his leg, and became very ill after infections continued to spread.

Saint Nunzio was canonized in October 2018, by Pope Francis, who described him as an elite example of patience and gentleness in his suffering.

In addition, we have 12 men preparing for the permanent diaconate, and that is on the heels of 20 men ordained last June.

Priestly Vocation Survey Results

In conjunction with the World Day of Prayer for Vocations on May 11, the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops' Committee on Clergy, Consecrated Life, and Vocations released the **Ordination Class of 2025 Study**, conducted annually by the Center for Applied Research in the Apostolate (CARA) at Georgetown University.

9 in 10 seminarians said someone encouraged them to consider the priesthood.

Responsible for their nudge: Parish priest 60%

Friend 52%

Fellow Parishioner 42%

Never too young!

35% first considered the priesthood in elementary school

20% in high school.

Catholic school educated?
46% attended Catholic grade school

In the US there are 405 men who will be ordained this year in 115 dioceses and eparchies and 36 religious institutes. The survey was completed by 309 men.

Bishop Mark's travels, where, if he finds a young man or woman, he thinks may have a vocation, he takes their name and prays for them every day. That list is up to 200 folks!

"It is the work of Fr. Crenwelge, and his predecessors' - Fr. (Dennis) Schuelkens and Msgr. (Paul) Hudock - tireless service in traveling the state. We priests and deacons and sisters and brothers are asked to play our part—to encourage vocations and to live our vocations in such a

way that it is attractive to young men and women.

"And we ask you, the lay faithful, to play your part, not only in praying for more vocations, but to encourage your children and grandchildren, your nieces and nephews."
