
NO GREATER LOVE THAN THIS



In today's Gospel, John shares what Christ said to his disciples: "No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends (John 15:13)."

As we celebrate this Easter Season and the Resurrected Christ, we exclaim Jesus's

message - NO GREATER LOVE THAN THIS!.

Saint Damien de Veuter of Molokai took Christ's words to heart.

On May 10, the Church honors this man whose ministry led him to Molokai, Hawaii. Molokai is one of the least inhabited of the Hawaiian Islands, and in 1866 it was considered far from paradise. That is when it became home to a rural leper settlement in the Kalaupapa Peninsula, surrounded on three sides by the ocean and the fourth side was a mountain. The settlement was the Hawaiian government's way of isolating lepers. Basic needs were ignored by the government and the majority of citizens turned a blind eye to it. Kalaupapa became an area of filth, despair, and lawlessness.



Father Damien knew well of this hell on earth as Hawaiians described it. He had been serving in Hawaii for nearly 9 years, when in 1873, he volunteered to minister

to the leper community. The priest was determined to turn it into a community of respect, empathy, and love; and he succeeded.

"My greatest pleasure is to serve the Lord in His poor children rejected by other people," he said.

Saint Damien shared the stories of these hopeless forgotten people and was able to secure support from all races and religions. He built everything from care facilities and houses to chapels and coffins.



Twelve years after he began his ministry in Kalaupapa, Fr. Damien contracted the disease and took it as an opportunity to empathize even more with the flock he served – from then on it was "we, lepers" he would note.

He lived another four years before he died.

In all St. Damien spent 16 years taking care of the lepers young and old. It was the children who tugged strongest at his heartstrings and fueled his fire to keep working. He knew theses small boys and girls were ripped away from their families because of a circumstance that was out of their control. He made it his mission to bring hope to the hopeless and love to those who felt ashamed and unlovable.

He taught what he believed – God's love is for all, and it is in the Eucharist we find enough food for the journey – a journey toward a glorious soul and eternal life.

"Without the Blessed Sacrament a position like mine would be intolerable," he said. "Eucharist is the bread that gives strength."

After his death, his story of selflessness became well known and more attention was given to the need for more humane treatment, better living conditions, and medical research of the disease. Mandatory isolation continued in the US until 1969.

Miracles began to happen for those who called on Fr. Damien's intercession as early as 1895. He was declared venerable in 1897, Blessed in 1993, and was canonized in 2009.


Prayer to St. Damien:

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LESSONS OF ST. JOHN OF AVILA: EVANGELIZE! EVANGELIZE THOSE CLOSEST FIRST!

Have Confidence the Holy Spirit is in You



Saint John of Avila's life is a reminder that God wants us to first evangelize at home. So, welcome the Holy Spirit within – "He will console you, enlighten you, refresh you, and direct you." – St. John of Avila.

He is a Doctor of the Church, "grounded in the sacred Scriptures, passionately concerned for the truth, and an outstanding precursor of the new evangelization," noted the Holy See at the 16th century saint's doctoral proclamation in 2012. His feast day is May 10.

Saint John of Avila was an influential parish priest and friend to several well-known saints including, St. Teresa of Avila, St. Ignatius of Loyola, and St. John the Cross. He had an exceptional knowledge of the bible and would present St. Paul's letters with such emphasis and compassion that those who heard him would say they felt like it was St. Paul talking directly to them.

He had lofty dreams wanting to leave his homeland to be a missionary priest, but God had a different plan.

He was born in Spain. As a boy he had hoped to become a lawyer. He even began to study law at 14, but by the age of 18 realized God was calling him to dive deeper into his faith. He returned home and began his discernment, ultimately becoming

a priest in 1526. His next big dream was to be a priest to the people of West Indies - islands of the New World along Gulf of Mexico. He never received that assignment. His archbishop told him he just couldn't send him away, because he would be more influential at home. Within the first three years of being a priest, Father John was a popular preacher. The archbishop saw that he was strengthening so many souls in Spain through his devout celebration of the Mass, preaching, and inspiring catechetical efforts. It was the wise to keep the young priest in Seville, Spain to revive the faith that was severely damaged by heresy, other religions, and politics.

While his homilies and preaching revived the faithful, it also stirred up controversy. Father John lived a life of poverty, while other clergy lived lavishly. They turned him in for preaching lies - that the doors of Heaven would not be open for the rich. He was arrested and imprisoned. He remained devoted to prayer, studying, and writing. He began the *Audi*, *Filia* (his book *Listen*, *O Daughter*) requested by a Spanish nun seeking spiritual strength for herself and others. After a year in prison, he was found not guilty of any crime and released.

He went on to shepherd the faithful in his homeland for 18 years, before illness slowed him down in 1551.

In addition to *Audi*, *Filia*, the Church has acknowledged he wrote eighty-two sermons, Scripture commentaries, 257 letters, and various other minor works on reform in the Church (the great Council of Trent that he participated). *Finding Confidence in Times of Trial* is a book of letters from the saint to St. Teresa of Avila and also to priests, widows, the sick, the dying, and the persecuted.

His homilies for and about the Ascension and Pentecost are presented in the book The Holy Spirit Within, celebrating these two feasts that are among the greatest of the Church.

In honor of St. John of Avila, may we never tire of evangelizing those closest to us.



A discernment retreat is a time for discovery."

Religious sisters serving in the diocese are representative of more than 20 communities/congregations. Gomez said, the future retreat will still have religious sisters from various religious orders assisting, sharing personal testimonies, and providing a joyful witness of what it means to be a consecrated Religious Sister.

So, while the diocese goes back to the drawing board to plan a future retreat, please join us as we pray for vocations for our beautiful Mountain State. Keep including vocations in your Rosaries.

As Fr. Brian Crenwelge, Director of Vocations for the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston, said promoting the retreat, "God calls each of us to a particular vocation. To some, he whispers on their hearts that he wants them to give of their wholes lives to him in a radical way—to consecrate themselves to him so as to follow him more closely and live now like we will live in heaven. The religious vocation is ultimately a vocation of love."

"We should ever be grateful for and love the vocation to which God has called us. This applies to every vocation because, after all, what a privilege it is to serve God, even in the least capacity!" Blessed Fr. Solanus Casey

"Discernment is discovery," Sr. Martha said. "Our future retreat will help the young ladies in our diocese experience a glimpse of life as a religious sister - one of commitment, prayer, and community."
