# Memorial of Our Lady of Fatima May 13th ~ Pray the Rosary



Thursday, May 13th is the day we honor the Memorial of Our Lady of Fatima. On this day in 1917, the Blessed Mother chose to appear to three children: Lucia dos Santos and her two younger cousins, Francisco and Jacinta, as they were out tending their sheep outside their village in Fatima, Portugal. Lucia, who was 10 but the eldest of the trio would often kneel in the open fields and pray the Rosary.

History has recorded it was about noon when a flash of light caught the children's attention. They said they saw a "brilliant" figure over the trees. The vision told them to pray for the conversion of sinners and an end to the war (World War I), and she would come back every month, on the 13th. As foretold apparitions happened again on June 13 and July 13. However, the children were prohibited to return to the Cova da Iria, where the previous appearances were, but when they returned on August 19, again the image appeared. Famously on September 13, the vision requested recitation of the Rosary for an end to the world war. It was on October 13, the "Lady" identified herself as "Our Lady of the Rosary" and again called for prayer and penance.

Pope Francis invites us to live out this month more dedicated to prayer. He reminds us to pray the Rosary as our Blessed Mother requests for the world and the conversion of sinners.

We celebrate the Ascension, acknowledging when Jesus gave his disciples the great command to proclaim the Good News to all nations, teaching them that He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead and His kingdom will have no end. He promised, "I am with you always, until the end of the ages" (Matthew 28:20).

The solemnity will be celebrated by some dioceses on May 13, the traditional 40 days after Easter.



# ONE MISSION ONE DAY Records Set, Great Memories Made

Not only is this the first vear that all 24 schools participated in this fun online fundraiser, but it is also the year the greatest number of donors stepped up to make a difference. Moreover, the amount raised was more than the double amount raised in 2020.

Thanks to our school supporters the official raised amount bv

midnight was \$481,774 for the individual schools. Additional donations are being input by hand so coordinators anticipate that amount will continue to increase through the weekend. Topping the list at midnight for most money raised was St. Vincent de Paul School in Wheeling by raising \$155,750. St. Paul School in Weirton secured the most donors with 308 gifts. The WV Catholic Foundation will present these two schools with an incentive gift of \$500 each for their accomplishment.

Many schools reported matching gifts from

individuals or businesses that helped them reach or exceed their expectations.

"It was exciting to see the donations post on the leaderboard for all 18 grade schools and six high schools," Heidi Sforza, director of annual giving for the diocese, said. "Our principals and advancement directors and volunteers set goals and we are so happy that so many

ONE MISSION ONE DAY of them not only reached but surpassed those amounts. It is a genuine outpouring of support for theses school families."

> All the funds will go directly to the schools designated by the donor. Schools will then put the investments into their predetermined areas which included items like tuition assistance, school improvements, playgrounds, special programs, and technology upgrades.

> This is the third year for the event and by far the most

successful. One Mission One Day, which is held the first Tuesday in May, was originally created by the school advancement directors of the Northern Panhandle Catholic schools in 2019 with the help of Sforza and Krissie Benson, director of stewardship and development for the diocese. Last year the event expanded across the state. One Mission One Day 2020 raised more than \$234,000 with 19 schools participating.

"These gifts are greatly appreciated and crucial for our schools' budgets especially during the



pandemic, when all large gathering fundraising to events had be cancelled," Benson said. school families "Our took this event seriously and made it heartfelt and fun. One Mission One Day was the perfect event to showcase our schools' creativity on an online platform."

Prayers, songs, interviews, testimonials, and photos flooded the social media pages of our

schools and school families, Sforza said.

"Tuition and parish contributions are not enough to cover all of the expenses in our schools, so they rely on their third-source funding - grants, gifts, and fundraisers," she said. "Every contribution to events like One Mission One Day makes a difference and our schools are so grateful."

# FROM HOMELESS TO HOUSED: KATHERINE'S STORY

In January of 2020, Katherine Elliott found herself without a home for her family, including her 1-year old daughter and her boyfriend.

"Through some unfortunate circumstances that were no fault of our own, we found ourselves homeless," said Katherine.

Because Katherine had a child, she did not qualify to stay at local winter freeze or homeless shelters. After receiving short-term help from Youth Services Systems, Katherine was referred to Catholic Charities West Virginia (CCWVa).

"Katherine and her family were ideal candidates for our Hospitality House and case management program," said Diana Bell, CCWVa Neighborhood Center Coordinator.

The Catholic Charities Hospitality House provides transitional housing for a family for three to six months. The family is able to stay intact and sleep under one roof while receiving intensive case management services to get back on their feet.

"The house was a life saver," said Katherine. "In the midst of COVID, with a child, it made everything so much better. I don't know where I would've been without it."

Katherine and her boyfriend, JR, met with CCWVa Case Manager Joe Sparksman weekly during their time living at the Hospitality House.

"Joe was our mentor. He helped walk us through everything, set us up with the programs we needed to get our life straight," said Katherine.

As part of the Hospitality House case management program, residents also meet with a representative from West Virginia Saves to learn about budgeting and saving money.

"Joe and everyone helped us get where we needed," said Katherine. "We were

able to save and pay our first month's rent at a house they connected us with through the Homeless Coalition."

JR has earned his CDL license, and Katherine is pursuing her goal of becoming an Emergency Medical Technician. Katherine's daughter recently turned two years old and is thriving in their new home.

"I just want to offer the most heartfelt, gracious, meaningful gratitude that I can express to Catholic Charities," said Katherine.

## SIXTH SUNDAY OF EASTER ~ MAY 9


### PRAYER INTENTIONS
