



ADVENT WREATH SHINES HOPE, PEACE, JOY, AND LOVE

The Advent wreath, it is a tangible reminder of our preparation and anticipation of the birth of Christ. It has evolved through the centuries and across cultures and faiths. Each element is symbolic of aspects of the Christmas story and our faith.

Traditionally the candles used are three purple and one pink. Purple, the color associated of royalty, represents prayer, penance, and works of mercy we take on during the season. The pink (rose) represents joy. This candle is lit on Gaudete Sunday (the third Sunday of Advent), which means “rejoice” and marks the halfway point until Christ’s birth.

Typically, the candles are displayed in a circle with a wreath of pine or similar around it. The evergreen is to signify God’s everlasting love. Some relate the circular shape to the crown of thorns.

Depending on culture or tradition the weeks represent hope, peace, joy, and love; or hope, faith, joy, and peace. It is a matter of semantics really. The overall meaning and respected custom are universal. Each are impressive and beautiful in their own right.

Some traditions name the candles. The first candle is called the prophet’s candle, representative of the prophecy of the birth of a Messiah in Isaiah, and signifies hope. The second candle, the Bethlehem candle, represents the humble town, seemingly at the time to be insignificant. However, God chose this town proving even the least is important to our Creator. This candle represents peace. The third candle is the shepherd’s candle and recalls the shepherds and their joy. According to Scripture, it was the shepherds who were first told about Christ’s birth (Luke 2:8-14). The fourth candle is known as the angels candle, a candle of love, symbolic of when they sang out, “Glory to God in the highest and peace to men of goodwill.”

Regardless of your advent wreath appearance, the most important element is in the pause for prayer and reflection. It prompts us to remember Scripture, the prophecy, Mary’s acceptance, and why Christ came to dwell among us. Let us remember that God is always present in our life and sent his only son to restore light and peace within and for us.

Dear Jesus, as we light the candle(s) on this Advent wreath, may the light of your presence bring joy to our hearts. Bless our family and our friends, and be with all those who are in need this holiday season. Amen.

All-powerful God, increase our strength of will for doing good that Christ may find an eager welcome at his coming and call us to his side in the kingdom of heaven, where he lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit one God, forever and ever. Amen.

2. SECOND WEEK - PEACE

Dear Jesus, you entered our world on Christmas as the Prince of Peace. This Advent, as we strive to become the-best-version-of-ourselves, fill us with a deep and abiding peace. Help us share that peace with everyone we encounter, especially those who need it most. Amen.



3. THIRD WEEK - JOY

Dear Jesus, help us focus on you during this busy season. May we stay aware of the joy you bring into our lives. We want to find you in the everyday moments and come with hearts of gratitude to your manger on Christmas. Amen.

4. FOURTH WEEK - LOVE

All-powerful God, your eternal Word took flesh on our earth when the Virgin Mary placed her life at the service of your plan. Lift our minds in watchful hope to hear

the voice which announces his glory and open our minds to receive the Spirit who prepares us for his coming. We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.

THE MEMORIAL OF ST. FRANCIS XAVIER

The Feast Day of St. Francis Xavier is a time to recognize this great missionary and also consider our own works of evangelization and care for others at the beginning of Advent.

In a quick summary of his life, St. Francis Xavier seemed pretty dynamic, happy, and confident; but he had his own struggles with depression and loneliness. His father died when he was just a young boy; in his teens he left home to study in Paris; while there his mother and sister died; and his other siblings were all married with families of their own. However, he chose to turn those negative energies into a challenge to be courageous with God as his navigator. He considered his faith as the greatest gift from his reverent parents. He chose to be a fisher of men and share his love of Christ.

He earned degrees in philosophy and theology. While studying at the University of Paris, he met St. Ignatius Loyola. They became close friends. In 1534, together with five other men they founded the Society of Jesus (the Jesuit order). In 1537, St. Francis Xavier was ordained a priest.



An unnamed fellow Jesuit said, “I have never met anyone more filled with faith and hope, more open-minded than Francis. He never seems to lose his great joy and enthusiasm. He talks to both the good and the bad. Anything he is asked to do, Francis does willingly, simply because he loves everyone.”

He chose that attitude. Despite what had to have been dangerous and often miserable travel and living conditions, he focused on God to keep him balanced and grateful. Not every stop or plan was successful for him, but he remained determined.

He believed that we can face any challenge and danger as long as we love God. In his words: “In this life, we find our greatest comfort living in the midst of danger, that is, if we confront them solely for the love of God.”

On his feast day, let us pray we are enthusiastic, adventurous, and passionate about evangelizing as he was.

ST. ANDREW PRAYER IN PREPARATION OF CHRISTMAS

The Feast of St. Andrew is Nov. 30th.

There is a beautiful Christmas Anticipation Prayer that begins on the Feast Day of St. Andrew and is to be recited 15 times a day until Christmas. This meditative prayer in its repetition helps increase our focus on the true meaning of Christmas – the gift of the Christ Child.

Hail and blessed be the hour and moment in which the Son of God was born of the most pure Virgin Mary, at midnight, in Bethlehem, in the piercing cold. In that hour vouchsafe, I beseech Thee, O my God, to hear my prayer and grant my desires (recite your request here) through the merits of Our Savior Jesus Christ and of His Blessed Mother. Amen

FROM FISHERMAN TO A FISHER OF MEN

We don’t know a lot of details about him and his life. However, we do know he was an apostle. He was a true believer of Jesus Christ, because the Gospel tells us he left everything to follow him. It was Andrew and his younger brother (Simon) Peter who while casting their fishing nets into the sea, were asked by Jesus Himself if they wanted to be “fishers of men” as we know from Matthew 4:18-20.

So, while we may not be able to quote his wisdom or describe details of his life, we do know that as an apostle and a Galilean. He was loyal, a preacher, a witness to miracles, and called to holiness by Christ.

In 1964, Pope Paul VI had St. Andrew’s relics in Vatican City sent to the Basilica of St. Andrew in Patras, Greece, including the cross on which he was martyred.



CONFRATERNITY OF ST. NICHOLAS

THE GIFT OF PRAYER FOR THE PROTECTION OF CHILDREN

As we begin Advent take time to learn about the Confraternity of St. Nicholas. This patron saint of children has a feast day to celebrate on Dec. 6. Consider honoring him by saying the Litany of St. Nicholas, the Daily Prayer of the Confraternity of St. Nicholas, and becoming a member of this group dedicated to pray for the protection of children.

Bishop Mark Brennan approved the formation of the confraternity in October, encouraging our pastors to promote it and invite parishioners to learn about the opportunity.

“In St. Matthew’s Gospel (19-14), Jesus tells his disciples: Let the children come to me

and do not prevent them; for the kingdom of heaven belongs to such as these. Scandals in society and the Church, going back many years, have taught us how important it is to take the Lord’s words to heart,” Bishop Brennan said in his Oct. 15th letter. “That is why our Diocese has a comprehensive program to protect children and young people in our parishes, schools, and camps, including strong background checks, fingerprinting for clergy, teachers and youth ministers and enhanced reporting procedures.

“But this is not all we must do. We must seek God’s help and the intercession of His saints in order to protect our children and young people from threats to their moral and spiritual development,” he added.

The Confraternity of Saint Nicholas is a public association of the faithful who, through prayer, fasting, and good works, are dedicated to the protection of all children from scandalization, abuse, and trafficking. The Confraternity seeks to create spiritual millstones and depths of prayer to drown those demons which inspire men and women to commit evil against children. The members of the Confraternity, by fulfilling its obligations, gain many spiritual benefits. Members enjoy the intercession of St. Nicholas, great wonder worker, Bishop, and patron of children. We pray that, as St. Nicholas defended the Divinity of Christ, he too by our prayers, fasting, and good works defends all children from harm.
