MARY, UNDOER OF KNOTS FEAST DAY SEPT. 28


When we become overwhelmed with anxiety and grief, or when we feel completely tied down not knowing how to break free, we need to focus on our faith and call to our Mother Mary to help us untie the knots in our lives.

September 28th is the Feast Day of Mary, Undoer of Knots. It is a beautiful Marian devotion.

The first reference to Mary as an untier of knots dates

back to a second century bishop, St. Irenaeus, who described how Eve's sins were knots of disobedience and they were untied by the Virgin Mary through her faith and devotion to God. Centuries later, St. Irenaeus' teachings and devotions to Mary strongly influenced German priest Fr. Jakob Rem in times of his own trouble and times he counseled others. In 1615, he was meeting with Wolfgang Langenmantel, a German nobleman, because his wife, Sophia Imoff, wanted a divorce. The priest and Wolfgang prayed to the Blessed Mother to intercede. The two continued to meet and pray over the course of a month. At their fourth meeting, Wolfgang brought the Jesuit priest the couple's wedding ribbon. It was a significant German custom in which the maid of honor tied a ribbon around the hands and arms of the couple during the sacrament of marriage as a sign of their unending union and commitment. The priest took the ribbon, raised it up before an image of Mary, as he untied the knots that once bound the couple at their wedding. When Fr. Rem finished untying the last knot in the ribbon, it turned pure white. They believed this to be affirmation that Mary heard their prayers. The couple remained happily married.

Around 1700, the couple's grandson, a priest, Fr. Heironymus Ambrosius Langenmantel, dedicated an altar in honor of the family at St. Peter am Perlach in Augsburg, Germany.



When Pope Francis was a newly ordained Jesuit priest in the 1980's, he was sent to

Germany to study and obtain a doctorate degree in theology. It was then he discovered St. Peter am Perlach Church and the altar dedicated to Our Lady. He was so impressed with the history and story behind the painting, and its simple yet profound meaning, he had copies of it placed in chapels and churches where he served in Argentina and South America. When he was a Cardinal, he had the image of Mary, Undoer of Knots placed on a chalice he had made for Pope Benedict XVI. A replica of the painting has also been placed inside the Vatican. Last Spring, Pope Francis had the image carried outside to the Vatican Gardens for an evening Marian prayer service, which finished a monthlong rosary commitment to pray for the end of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Like Pope Francis, we need to turn to Mary, Undoer of Knots. Look to her when the knots in our lives seem impossible to untie alone - marriage troubles, money problems, unemployment, illness, loneliness, loss, depression, and self-pity. Take your devotion prayer to another level and call upon Mary, Undoer of Knots to help turn around our doubts the can nots, will nots, and am nots. So, we are no longer tied to negativity and have the confidence with Mary as our intercessor to keep moving forward and placing all of our trust in Jesus.

Pope Francis' Prayer to Mary, Undoer of Knots




Holy Mary, full of God's presence during the day of your life, you accepted with full humility the Father's will, and the devil was never capable of tying you up with his confusion.

Through your grace, your intercession and your example deliver us from all evil, Our Lady, and untie the knots that prevent us from being united with God, so that we, free from sin and error, may find Him in all things, may have our hearts placed in Him, and may serve Him always in our brothers and sisters.




