

OBEDIENCE, TRUST, AND HOPE

LET THE GOSPEL STRENGTHEN OUR LENTEN JOURNEY

On the second Sunday of Lent every year we hear the story of the Transfiguration. There are so many take aways from this story, but let this moment feed our hope as we complete the first leg of our Lenten journey.

Mark 9:2-10 illustrates for us Christ in all his glory talking to Moses and Elijah. Jesus wasn't alone with Moses (the image of Jewish law) and Elijah (the great prophet), his closest companions were with him.

Jesus had 12 apostles and countless disciples and followers, but Peter, James, and John were often pulled aside by Christ in pivotal moments. They were his best friends on earth. While on the mountain at the Transfiguration they had fallen asleep, but the radiant light from the heavens illuminating Elijah, Moses, and Jesus woke them. They overheard them talking to Christ about His Passion, death, and Resurrection. As Peter, James, and John got their wits about them and began to speak, Moses and Elijah's images faded away and a great cloud rolled in. The apostles were silenced as God's voice said, "This is my beloved Son. Listen to him."

Christ told them not to mention what they had seen or heard until "The Son of Man had risen from the dead." Although confused at Jesus' words, they obeyed.

When reflecting on this story and how it fits in our lives consider the trust, loyalty, hope, obedience, and love that each character exudes, and pray we too nurture those same qualities in our faith during this Lenten journey and beyond. God chose us to be on this earth at this very moment.

Christ chose Peter, James, and John to be at his side and experience miraculous moments like we hear about today - hair glistening and face as bright as the sun; and also at the moment of stark contrast we will hear in less than five weeks- the Agony in the Garden of Gethsemane, when Jesus is so distraught he is sweating blood, knowing of the unimaginable human suffering that is to come, but accepts for our salvation.

Just as our best friends see us through our greatest times and our worst, we can imagine that Peter, James, and John shared and understood Christ's greatest concerns, joys, and hopes better than the rest. John would be the only apostle present at the crucifixion and then guardian of Mary; Peter would become the first pope, and James the first apostle to be martyred.

Through times of joy, heartache, contentment, doubt, and restlessness, choose to be faithful friends of God.

As we reflect on the Transfiguration story, let it amaze us, and meditate on the entire Trinity being present – God the Father in voice, God the Son before them, and God the Holy Spirit in the magnificent light.



Lord, strengthen our trust and loyalty to the Church Jesus gave us and Peter built for the greater good, continue to shower us with the courage and grace to handle all challenges and difficulties, silence us when we want to throw stones, give us a voice to speak hope and mercy, and open our eyes to see how to use our free will wisely. Let our actions be an example of Your unconditional love. Amen.

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SPEAK TO GOD FROM "THE DEPTHS OF THE HEART" ST. GREGORY OF NAREK ~ FEBRUARY 27

On Feb. 27, we honor the memorial of St. Gregory of Narek, an Armenian monk, poet, philosopher, and composer. He is known throughout the world as "the watchful angel in human form."

This 10th-century mystical writer was declared a Doctor of the Church by Pope Francis in 2015. He described the saint that is honored by the Catholic Church and Armenian Apostolic Church as "an extraordinary interpreter of the human soul, offers words which are prophetic for us."



His book of prayers, *The Book of Lamentations* (aka *The Book of Narek*), is described by him as "an encyclopedia of prayer for all nations." It contains 95 prayers, each beginning with, "Speaking with God from the Depths of the Heart."

Saint Gregory was born in 951 in the Kingdom of Armenia, now Turkey. His mother died when he was young. His father was a ruling prince Armenian bishop, and scholar.

After his mother died, Gregory was sent to live at a monastery where his maternal great-uncle Anania was the abbot and monastery's founder. By the age of 26, Gregory was ordained a priest. He remained at the monastery the rest of his life, teaching theology in its school.

Losing his mother as a boy influenced St. Gregory's deep devotion to our Blessed Mother. He wrote, "This spiritual, heavenly mother of light cared for me as a son more than an earthly, breathing, physical mother could (included in his book as part of *Prayer 75*)."

Saint Gregory wrote many letters, chants, and several

books including the Song of Songs and a commentary on the Book of Job.

It was Gregory's father from the time Gregory could speak who taught him to talk to God all the time and be mindful of His divine presence.



Theologists compare St. Gregory's prayers as similar to Saint Augustine's Confessions.

As St. Gregory states his prayers were written "by the finger of God" (*Prayer 34*) and he saw God, "with my own eyes" (*Prayer 27f*).

Before he died, St. Gregory penned the importance he wanted his book to have on other faithful, "although I shall die in the way of all mortals, may I be deemed to live through the continued existence of this book...This book will cry out in my place, with my voice, as if it were me" (*Prayer 88b*; c).

Saint Gregory of Narek, pray for us, and let us always choose good just as you wrote as part of your prayer to God:

Almighty God, "You alone are great and generous in everything.

You are the definition of abundant goodness, Who pours forth constantly, without measure, more than we ask or expect, as Paul said in gratitude.

"For You commanded that we should do good, from dawn to dusk, in the same day, nine times fifty, plus four times ten.
Always attentive,

forgiving with an unfettered heart, something more

than the expectation of men's prayers."

The Interim Stage

For a Synodal Church: Community, Participation, Mission

After three years of the Universal Church's journey of Synodality, we *still* must ask ourselves... **Do we yet know how to be a synodal Church in mission?**

We must identify the <u>paths to follow</u> and the <u>tools to adopt</u> to <u>empower</u> all of **the baptized** to <u>contribute</u> to the Church's one...

MISSION: To Proclaim the Risen Lord and His Gospel to the World Today

Let us remember what Pope Francis has taught, regarding this Synod: "The important thing is how the reflection is done, that is, in a synodal way."

Diocesan-Wide Listening Sessions

The Bishops are asking us to hold more listening sessions – at the Diocesan level – to deepen our reflection.

Therefore, we will be conducting six (6) listening sessions, one in each vicariate, starting at 6:30 PM. They are:

Tuesday, February 27th: St. Francis de Sales, Beckley

Thursday, March 7th: St. Michael, Wheeling

The Nature of This Year's Sessions

More than just *listening* sessions, these gatherings are to be "**Conversations in the Spirit**" to **discern** the Will of God for our Church, by <u>listening</u> both to the <u>stirrings of the Holy Spirit</u>, within, and the <u>contributions of one another</u>.

Two Guiding Questions

The Bishops have provided us with two (2) guiding questions that we are going to discern responses to, together.

- 1. Where have I seen or experienced successes—and distresses—within the Church's structure(s)/organization/leadership/life that encourage or hinder the mission?
- 2. <u>How</u> can the structures and organization of the Church <u>help</u> all the baptized to <u>respond</u> to the call to proclaim the Gospel and to live as a community of love and mercy in Christ?

Preparing Yourself for These Sessions

We need to prayerfully and spiritually prepare for these sessions, by personally reflecting upon synodality.

We ask that you read and reflect upon some Scripture, in preparation for the listening session:

John 14, Romans 12, and Isaiah 61.

Entrust yourself to the Father, converse with the Lord Jesus, & listen to the Holy Spirit, about these questions.

SECOND SUNDAY OF LENT

First Reading: Genesis 22:1-2, 9a, 10-13, 15-18

Abraham's trust in God is put to the ultimate test – the willingness to sacrifice what he cherished on earth – a true gift from God – Abraham's own son. His actions backed his words, "Here I am Lord" I've come to do your will. Gospel: Mark 9:2-10

The Transfiguration – Moses and Elijah appeared and talked to Jesus, whose robes became dazzling white. This was all in the sight of Peter, James, and John. When the images of the Law and Prophet were gone, Christ told the three apostles to not tell anyone what they had seen until "the Son of Man had risen from the dead." So, they told no one, but to each other wondered what Jesus meant by "rising from the dead".
